Objective

When providing personal information to a client, client advocate, client lawyer, provider, supplier or employer, you must take care to protect individual privacy at all times. See also Responding to a request for official or personal information.

Policy

1.0 Rules

- a** You must check all incoming client documentation to ensure the information relates to the client and does not contain inappropriate or non-injury related information.

You must complete a content and privacy check before disclosing any personal information, even if we initiated the disclosure. A content check ensures we only give the information that was requested and is relevant. A privacy check ensures we only give information about the client who is requesting it.

You must also include an appropriate covering letter when providing requested information.

If sending information via email to an external email address make sure the email address has been verified in Eos first.

2.0 Privacy checking client information

- a** Before you provide a copy of a client's personal information or file you must complete a privacy check to ensure that no other person's information is included.

The case owner or Client Information Requests team (CIR) is responsible for privacy checking full client copy files that they prepare.

For anything other than a minor enclosure you must add a 'Contact' in Eos noting that documents have been privacy checked prior to disclosure.

In particular, you must ensure:

- the recipient's name and address is correct and, if appropriate, check the 'Verification and 'Valid Address' statuses
- information about people other than the client is removed
- any information that may negatively affect the client's physical or mental health is discussed with their medical practitioner (e.g. GP or Psychiatrist) prior to release. If the medical practitioner agrees it may be harmful, we can withhold that information
- any information you send to a supplier is fit for purpose. Only provide what is required, particularly in respect to non-injury conditions.

Before you do the privacy check, clear your work area. If possible, use the dedicated privacy desk in your unit or an available empty desk.

3.0 Printing client information

- a** Only print documents for one client at a time, unless you're batch printing and processing a bulk mailing of a standard letter. Make sure the number of letters matches the number of envelopes.

When you print client information you must:

- always use secure print or user box functionality to print enclosures
- always fasten documents using staples, not paper clips. When printing a multiple page letter use the Multi-functional Device (MFD) staple functionality, if available
- avoid using mail merge
- not put post-it notes on letters.

4.0 Enclosure types

- a** There are two types of enclosure, substantial and minor.

A substantial enclosure generally contains varied and potentially sensitive health information or multiple documents.

NOTE Examples

- independence allowance report
- vocational independence report
- home and community support assessment report
- medical case review report
- complex social rehabilitation assessment
- lump sum independence allowance (LSIA) assessment

- b** A minor enclosure is routine correspondence or one or two short documents.

NOTE Examples

- a 1 or 2 page letter, eg a letter approving home help
- a letter with a form or information sheet included
- a short report with limited medical information in it, eg a report about a simple injury such as a broken ankle that does not refer to pain issues or other medical conditions
- reimbursement claim forms

5.0 When to use the ACC6173 Information disclosure checklist

- a** Full or partial copy file

If you're providing a full copy file or partial copy file you must complete an ACC6173 information disclosure checklist when you do the privacy check.

- b** Substantial enclosure

If you're providing a substantial enclosure completing an ACC6173 information disclosure checklist is optional. You may still find it useful to follow the checklist to make sure you don't miss anything.

- c** Minor enclosure

If you're providing a minor enclosure completing an ACC6173 information disclosure checklist is optional. But you must make sure that:

- the recipient's name and address is correct and, if appropriate, check the 'Verification and 'Valid Address' statuses
- information about people other than the client is removed
- any information that may negatively affect the client's physical or mental health is discussed with their medical practitioner (e.g. GP or Psychiatrist) prior to release. If the medical practitioner agrees it may be harmful, we can withhold that information
- any information you send to a supplier is fit for purpose. Only provide what is required, particularly in respect to non-injury conditions.

6.0 Client addresses

- a** You must check the 'Verification' and 'Valid Address' statuses of the client or authorised representative's physical address, and either verify or reverify by telephone or in person as needed.

Verify their address on first contact, and then either:

- at regular intervals
- before you provide any information by email, post or courier.

Only use a window envelope or labelope to display the address and make sure only the name and address are visible.

Always print the address from Eos using the CLI05 Address label and make sure Eos is set to default to the postal address.

7.0 Changes to a client's residential or mailing address

a Changes to a client's residential or mailing address must be requested by either:


- the client
- someone with authority to act on behalf of the client. There must be a signed ACC5937 Authority to act form on the client's file.


We'll accept written notification of a change of address by letter, on a signed ACC form such as an ACC250, or on an ACC210 Change of bank account or address form. We will also accept a scanned copy by email. See Communication using email.


We'll accept verbal notification of a change of address from the client, after they confirm their identity by providing the attached information.

b Any time the client provides information that we can verify in Eos, make sure that you check the 'Verification' status and verify or re-verify as appropriate.

c A current Home address in Eos should always be a residential address.

8.0 Temporary client addresses

a If the client has a temporary physical address, the client must specifically confirm that the temporary address is appropriate for ACC to send documents to. If they do, in Eos add the temporary address as the home address. Task to remember to update Eos once the client returns to their normal mailing address.

If the client does not request for mail to be sent to their temporary address, then do not change their home address to the temporary address. The client must collect the information from an ACC office.

You may send blank forms to a temporary address. They must not contain any client details.

9.0 Alternative address

a An alternative address should only be used as a mailing address IF the current home address does not receive mail.

For example,

- where the client uses a PO box instead of receiving mail to their home address
- where the client is deceased, we should keep the address as their last physical address and load the details of their representative as the alternative address.

10.0 Client email addresses

a Ensure you:

- only use a verified client email address in Eos
- create emails and attach documents from within Eos
- complete a privacy check
- have disabled auto population of email addresses in Outlook

The "ACC Privacy Check" tool will also support a targeted second check for emails sent externally which include any attachments, or client or customer identifiers.


11.0 Provider and supplier addresses

- a** If you're an Eos user you must use Eos when checking provider and vendor addresses. See Searching for provider or vendor addresses in Eos. Make sure you compare the provider or vendor's contact details with those in Eos. If they need updating you must:

- ask them to email you their new contact details
- email the new details to the Provider/Vendor Registrations (PVR) team at Registrations@acc.co.nz and put 'Change contact details' in the subject line.

Or, the provider or vendor may email the PVR team with a copy to you. Physical and email addresses, phone and fax numbers are automatically updated in Eos from the Medical Fees Processing (MFP) system.

NOTE What if a vendor/provider is no longer involved in a claim?

Once a vendor or provider is no longer actively involved in the claim, remove them from the participants list. This reduces the chance of incorrectly selecting them and appropriately disclosing information later on

12.0 Delivery options for clients, client advocates, client lawyers

- a** If a client, their advocate, or their lawyer requests a copy of the client's file, we prefer to provide an electronic copy on a password protected CD or USB. You may send the CD or USB by post with an appropriate covering letter. See Responding to a request for official or personal information.

If they want a printed copy we prefer that they collect it from us. We do this to ensure their information is secure and only accessed by authorised people.

Only consider sending personal information by courier if specifically requested. See 18.0 'When to send client information by courier' below.

13.0 Exception – Clients in prison

- a** If a client is in prison and they don't have an advocate, we can only provide them with a printed copy of their file. Clients in prison generally don't have access to computers. You must send them an INP12 Personal info request - provide info - clients in prison letter, which includes suitable wording for clients in prison about the risks of using a courier. Do not use the ACC6181 information sheet.

Please note that in most cases we'll need to write to a client in prison as we'll be unable to contact them by telephone. However, if you're able to phone a client who's in prison, you can record their preferred delivery method as a Contact in Eos. Do not release the information until you receive the client's instructions.

If the client has not nominated a lawyer or advocate for us to send the information to, you must contact the client when their information is ready to advise that we will prepare a paper copy to be couriered to the prison. The client will need to be made aware that prison staff check all incoming packages, which may include their package.

14.0 Information for reviews and appeals

- a** If a full or partial copy file is required for a review or appeal, or a transcript of a review hearing, you may:

- ask the recipient to collect it from an ACC office
- send it to them by post on a password protected CD or USB
- send it to them by email within a password protected PDF if the file is small. This is not recommended for large files that need more than one email
- deliver it in person to the client if appropriate, after completing an identity check (eg. as part of a scheduled outreach visit).

Only send the information by courier if this is specifically requested. See 18.0 'When to send client information by courier' below.


Do not use post (if printed) to provide full or partial copy files, review transcripts or relevant documents that relate to a review or appeal.

15.0 Collecting from an ACC office

a A requestor may collect their information or file from an ACC office:

- If the information is prepared at a different office, you must courier it to the appropriate ACC branch or unit to be collected. Double envelope the information before you place it in the courier bag
- You must check the person's authorisation and identification before handing over the information. Complete the ACC6179 form and upload to the claim)

16.0 Sending information by email

a If using email to send or receive client information ensure you:

- remember the "one email, one client" rule. Each email you send, with or without attachments, must only refer to a single client or recipient
- send your email and attachments to a verified email address
- complete a privacy check
- check all email threads and delete any information that is not relevant to the client
- ask another staff member to double check attachments if you have any doubts about sending the information
- never use a Multi-Functional Device (MFD) to send documents outside of ACC
- use the "ACC Privacy Check" email notification to check all attachments before sending your email.

When sending a verification email from Eos, remove the party name from the 'Subject' field and replace it with "Please confirm your email address"

17.0 When to send client information by post

a You can use post to send client information if it's a minor enclosure or it's on a password protected CD.

You can send substantial enclosures by post, however, you must:

- obtain the client's agreement for it to be posted, especially if it contains sensitive personal information
- record this agreement in Eos and make the client aware of the nature of the material in the enclosure
- check with the client before sending each enclosure.

If the client has any concerns about the material being posted then you must use an alternative delivery method, such as a courier.

You must carefully check the items that you place in the envelope to make sure:

- they relate to the right client, the right claim(s) and the right request
- multi-page items are stapled and there are no missing pages or extra pages attached.

Ensure the envelope is securely sealed before sending.

NOTE Envelope peer checks

If you're sending more than one page, the Privacy Team highly recommend getting a colleague to check your letter before the envelope is sealed. This involves taking the documents out of the envelope and checking that they relate to the right client and are supposed to be included. Many privacy breaches have been prevented by a peer check!


18.0 When to send client information by courier


- a** You may only use a courier to provide information to a client, client advocate or client lawyer if you have the client's consent to use courier.
- You must reconfirm consent separately for each information request
 - The client must specifically request delivery by courier
 - You must let them know the risks of sending their information by courier. See the ACC6181 Receiving personal information by courier information sheet

Before providing any information by courier you must:

- check the recipient's address including, if appropriate, the 'Verification' and 'Valid Address' statuses and the recipient's authority to receive the information
- place the information in a clearly addressed envelope or package before you put it in the courier bag.

NOTE Exception

19.0 Clients that live overseas

- a** You may send personal information to a client if they live overseas.

You may only send client information to their advocate, insurer, representative or employer if you have the client's consent and the requestor has authority to act on behalf of the client. See the Privacy Act 2020, Principle 6, Subclause (1)(b).

The staff member preparing the password protected CD, eg case owner, is responsible for sending the disk overseas.

20.0 Delivery options for suppliers, providers, GPs and employers

- a** You may send documents by courier if requested by a supplier, provider, General Practitioner (GP) or employer. You must request a signature on delivery.

Only include information about one client in a package or envelope and make sure the package is clearly addressed before you place it in the courier bag.

If you need to send information about multiple clients, use a separate courier bag for each client. This applies to both printed information and password protected CDs.

21.0 What to do when client information is returned to us

- a** When someone returns client information to us, eg personal information that has been included with a referral to a provider or a copy file returned from a Review Hearing or Appeal, you must create a 'Contact' in Eos to record what's been received before you place the documents in the document destruction bin.

Create the 'Contact' at Claim level. If multiple claims are involved, create it at Party level.

Make sure you include:

- as much detail as possible about what was received, eg "Medical Case Review copy medical notes", "Appeal copy file" etc, and how it was received, eg sealed envelope, attached to provider report etc
- what you did with the documents, eg placed in secure document destruction bin, uploaded to claim file record etc, and any other relevant information.

Personal Information and Privacy Guidelines

Personal Information and Privacy Policy – Objective

ACC's [Personal Information and Privacy Policy](#) sets out how ACC collects, stores, uses, discloses, retains, and protects personal information.

Personal information is taonga (treasured), and we consider ourselves to be kaitiaki (guardians) of any personal information we receive. For the purposes of this policy, personal information includes health information. We are committed to managing personal information in line with the Privacy Act 2020, the Health Information Privacy Code 2020, any related legislation and recognised best practice.

We have a wide range of statutory functions and duties under the Accident Compensation Act 2001. We collect, use, store and share personal information to fulfil those functions and duties, as well as for related lawful activities. As such we are entrusted with personal information, and it is fundamental that we protect this information and use it only for permitted purposes and in appropriate ways.

Key to our goal of Kaitiakitanga (Guardianship) is the value we create for our public and for our partners, including our Māori Treaty partners. Maintenance of public trust and support for the scheme and how we deliver it is critical to the sustainability of the scheme. To achieve this everyone at ACC must be well-equipped to protect the personal information entrusted to us by our customers, our people, our providers, and our businesses.

Personal Information and Privacy Guidelines

These guidelines are designed to provide our people with meaningful and practical guidance on how to care for and use personal information in our daily activities, supplement ACC's Personal Information and Privacy Policy. It is important that everyone considers how these guidelines should be applied in the area that you work.

Who this applies to:

Our Personal Information and Privacy Policy and these Guidelines apply to all ACC people, including employees, secondees, and independent contractors. For specific Accountabilities, including our Roles and Responsibilities, please see ACC's Personal Information and Privacy Policy.

Definitions:

Personal information is defined as information that relates to an identifiable individual.

Personal information includes but is not limited to:

- Staff information
- medical records and history
- the circumstances of injury

- contact details
- records of our customers' interactions with us
- recordings and photographs
- our notes, records and discussions about our customers and their claims
- contact with any health provider
- recordings of calls with us
- financial information, such as bank account details, IRD numbers, income or payments received
- information about an individual's health, medical history, or disability (health information)
- information about the health services provided to an individual (health information)

RELEASED UNDER THE
OFFICIAL INFORMATION ACT

3.1 We collect, use and store personal information to carry out our functions and responsibilities under the Accident Compensation Act 2001 and for related lawful activities.

What this means for you

Personal information includes all information about an identifiable individual. Information can also be considered personal information if it can be linked to an individual when combined with other available information. In other words, information that could be used to reasonably identify an individual, when combined with other available information or knowledge.

The types of personal information we have access to include all information held about our customers, our providers, businesses, and our people.

We will only collect personal information by means that are lawful, fair and do not intrude unreasonably on an individual's personal affairs. "Fair and reasonable" in this context means we will aim to collect personal information from individual customers rather than third parties unless there is a lawful reason for doing otherwise. When collecting information from third parties we obtain consent from the individual concerned, unless there is a good reason why consent is not required.

Any collection of data and information must be for a lawful and well-defined purpose. Transparency is important for trust and respect and recognising people's mana.

Doing it right

Treating all information as if it was your own. Personal information is taonga (treasured) and we consider ourselves to be kaitiaki (guardian) of any personal information we receive.

- We only collect personal information we need
- We collect information directly from the individual wherever possible and from third parties with the individual's consent, unless there is a good reason why consent is not required
- We consider all personal information with respect, even if an individual is not named
- Every time we handle personal information, we keep in mind ACC's purpose and the purpose for which it was collected
- Asking the question - How does the collection of this information relate to ACC's purpose and contribute towards creating positive outcomes for our customers.
- Respect and uphold the mana and dignity of the people, whānau, communities or groups who share their data and information with ACC
- If collecting data for research purposes, it is de-identified to the extent possible

Doing it wrong

- Collecting irrelevant or unnecessary personal information
- Collecting personal information for use in training purposes
- While working at ACC, Hayden is also completing a PhD on rock climbing safety and uses his EOS access to extract claims data to inform his research.

- Andrew is writing a survey for clients. He chooses to include questions that will not answer the current research question but may be useful in the future.
- Not telling people, in a way that makes sense to them, what data or information is collected about them and why, even if it's used or shared in a way that does not and cannot be used to identify them.

Tips and tricks

- ✓ Ask yourself whether you could identify someone based on the information you're collecting.
- ✓ Ask yourself – Is the information I am collecting necessary for me to provide the requested service? Is there a way of doing so without the collection of personal information?
- ✓ Those who hold people's information can grow its value. They may do this by creating and sharing insights, or by returning collective, non-personal data back to the people and community it came from for their use. In all cases they must comply with the law, protect people's privacy, and maintain people's trust and confidence.
- ✓ Be mindful of New Zealand's cultural diversity, and the different perspectives, needs and approaches that should influence how we work to benefit individuals, whānau, a community or iwi.
- ✓ When deciding what information to collect and use to develop insights or for research, recognise that different groups and people may value qualitative and quantitative information about themselves differently.

3.2 We commit to making people aware of the collection of information

<p>What this means for you</p>
<p>We have an obligation to tell anyone we are collecting information from why we are collecting it.</p> <p>In claims, we do this as part of our standard claims management onboarding automatically. In corporate functions, this is mostly going to happen around the personal information of our people for the purposes of people management, i.e., med certs for sick leave, individual CVs.</p> <p>When personal Information is being collected for research purposes consideration needs to be given to why this is being collected, what is the lawful purpose of the research, can the information be de-identified and is the information being collected necessary for the identified purpose.</p> <p>Be transparent and help people understand about the collection and use of their data or information, their right to access and corrections, and what choices they have.</p>
<p>Doing it right</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • As part of a customer onboarding conversation, Alex ensures the privacy statement is shared with the customer and they confirm they have understood it. • A customer's rehabilitation needs have changed and we would like them to attend a new assessment. We need additional medical notes, so we call our customer to let them know what we need to collect, and how we will be using and disclosing it.
<p>Doing it wrong</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • We obtain personal information from a customer's employer without advising the client of what information we require and why? • Using a customer's personal information for a research project or survey when they have declined to participate. • Collecting information about a customer from a 3rd party without their knowledge or consent.
<p>Tips and tricks</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Are you using the information for the purpose we've advised it was collected? ✓ Ask yourself - What's being collected or used, why it's required. ✓ If and why it will be shared with other agencies or professionals. ✓ What laws allow the collection or use? If you are unsure, please contact the Privacy Team.

3.3 We facilitate access to and respect an individual's right to seek amendment of factually incorrect personal information as a key priority

What this means for you - ACCESS

As an organisation that holds personal information, we must allow individuals access to the information we hold about them.

People can only ask for information about themselves unless they are acting on another person's behalf and have written permission.

Requests for personal information can be received via email, letter, phone or in person.

Once a request has been received, we must acknowledge the request and provide the requested information within 20 working days. The website for the Privacy Commissioner provides a response calculator to allow you to confirm the date we must provide a response to the customer and factors in weekends and public holidays.

There may be some situations where there are good reasons to refuse a request for access to personal information, e.g., the information may breach someone else's privacy or releasing it may pose a serious threat to someone's safety. In these instances, you should discuss these scenarios with your Team Leader or the Privacy Team.

Doing it right

- If you're unsure, liaise with the privacy team
- Ensure the information requested relates to the individual making the request.
- Acknowledge the request and use the timeframes calculator on the privacy commission website to ensure we meet our legislative timeframes
- Gary receives a call from a customer who would like a copy of the medical notes we hold relating to his ankle injury. Gary verifies the customer's details and confirms the specific records the customer would like a copy of. At the conclusion of the conversation, Gary documents the conversation and sends the customer an INP01: Personal Info Request Acknowledgment. He then sends the task off for completion.

Doing it wrong

- Jo receives a request from Karen about information ACC holds in relation to her daughter. Jo releases the information, but Karen's daughter is over 18, however, Karen does not have permission to act on her daughter's behalf.
- A customer asks for a copy of a medical report by email, which we are unable to locate. We respond to the other questions in the email, but don't take any further action to find

and provide the medical report. This results in ACC not addressing the request within 20 working days.

Tips and tricks

- ✓ Be proactive and make it as easy as possible for customers to access their personal information.
- ✓ Tell them about their rights and encourage and support them to use those rights.

What this means for you - AMENDMENT

We do our best to ensure all personal information held by us is correct, but mistakes happen. Customers have the right to request that we correct any information they feel is incorrect, inaccurate, or misleading.

We acknowledge and respond to these requests in a timely manner. Legislative timeframes for Personal Information Requests are 20 working days. If the information cannot be corrected, the customer has the right to attach a statement of correction to the information.

Disability, culture, language, or literacy may prevent people from feeling comfortable asking to see their information and can also result in general concerns about where their information is, and which agencies have access to it. Offer the information about rights in a safe and comfortable way that supports the Customer's ability to absorb and understand the information being provided.

It's important to note that the Privacy Act 2020 requires agencies to "provide reasonable assistance" to people who wish to request access to their personal information or request correction of their personal information.

Doing it right

- Jo receives a call from a customer who disagrees with statements made by their provider in their latest medical report. The provider confirms this was their accurate opinion at the time. The customer still disagrees, so the customer is asked to submit a statement of correction to ensure it is read together with the original document in the future.
- Jo receives a call from a customer saying their address isn't correct. Jo acknowledges the request and actions it, immediately, informing the customer the correction has been made.

Doing it wrong

- Jim receives a call asking him to update a customer's contact details. He does not check that he is speaking with the individual concerned and it turns out this was a malicious act by the customer's ex-partner.

Tips and tricks

Ask yourself:

- ✓ Am I dealing with the person that the personal information relates to?
- ✓ Have I acknowledged the request?
- ✓ Where does the information need to be corrected?
- ✓ Can I correct it?
- ✓ Is a statement of Correction more appropriate?
- ✓ Have I recorded the request for correction in our systems?
- ✓ Have I responded to the requestor with the outcome?

3.4 We commit to using personal information only for the purpose for which it was obtained and other lawful purposes.

<p>What this means for you</p>
<p>We all need to be aware that the personal information ACC holds is in our care for purposes that relate to ACC and what we do. Information should only be used for legitimate reasons, and that relate to the core functions and purpose of ACC.</p> <p>If you cannot answer the following questions when using information, you should not be using it:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What is the reason to use this information? • Is that related to the purpose we collected it for? • Have we informed the customer it may be used for this purpose? <p>There might be occasions where we hold information gathered for one purpose that could be lawfully used for another. However, the circumstances within which this is allowed under the Privacy Act are limited, like non-identifiable information making up part of a research project, or de-identified training resources. Where this is proposed, advice should always be sought from the Privacy team first.</p>
<p>Doing it right</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Engage with the Privacy team and/or Ethics Panel when you require advice. • Aroha, one of Tama’s team is unwell with a serious illness. Tama advises the team that Aroha is away but does not share any information about Aroha’s illness. • Ensuring that we are using de-identified data whenever possible or practicable for a research project. • Use the correct technical processes, methods, and approaches for the kind of analysis or research you are doing. • A GP provides medical notes that did not form part of ACC’s request. We advise the GP of the incident and ask that they provide only the information that was requested and securely destroy the incorrect information.
<p>Doing it wrong</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Using personal information for training purposes without the customer providing their authority for their information to be used in this manner. • Mel’s manager discloses her age to some colleagues without her permission. • Using personal information in a way that is not aligned to the Code of Conduct or Code of ACC Claimants’ Rights.
<p>Tips and tricks</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ We should only access, use, or share personal information with others (including ACC employees) in accordance with ACC policies and guidelines.

- ✓ Communicate openly with our customers about how we intend to use their information
- ✓ Ask whether the information you wish to use is both relevant *and* necessary for the purpose you collected it for – less is best when using personal information.

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3.5 Personal information is disclosed to other parties only where there is legal authority to do so

What this means for you
<p>We hold information that is Taonga to the people it relates to.</p> <p>There are times when we'll have to share information with third parties for ACC to be able to do our job. When we share information, we need to make sure this only happens when we have the authority to do so.</p> <p>There are some limited circumstances where we may be able to share information without client authority. However, the circumstances within which this is allowed under the Privacy Act are limited. For example, occasions when we need to share information to protect our people and others – such as, when we share information relating to a customer's behaviour with the Police to ensure the safety of providers or our people. Where this is proposed, advice should always be sought from the Privacy team first.</p> <p>If you have queries, please raise these with your leader, the Privacy Team or OIA Services.</p> <p>If there isn't a clear link between why we collected the information and our intended disclosure, we need to consider if the disclosure is necessary. We can always confirm with our customers that they authorise us to disclose information.</p>
Doing it right
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Recognise that the trust people place in you, comes with an obligation to care for and respect the information they have shared. • IRD contacts us for information relating to a customer's weekly compensation. Krystal checks Promapp for the process related to sharing information and provides the information back to the requestor. • Jane calls ACC to try and sort out her self-employed husband's levy payments. There is no authorisation on file for Jane to act on her husband's behalf. We obtain verbal consent from Jane's husband and encourage him to complete an Authority to Act form. • A customer contacts us via the ACC Facebook page. ACC's social media team responds to the customer, without disclosing any personal information, and provides them with the details of who to contact about their claim. • Understand to your own satisfaction the potential value of the information you collect, and when it might be used in a non-personal form (for example, to develop new insights that may improve outcomes).
Doing it wrong
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Medical notes are emailed to a provider without checking to ensure the provider is the intended recipient before hitting send. • An advocate who only has authority to act on the customers behalf on claim A, is incorrectly sent information about claim B, which is not covered by the authority.

- Rob discloses information to an individual without verifying that they are an authorised party on the claim record.

Tips and tricks

- ✓ Act as a Kaitiaki of the taonga ACC holds.
- ✓ When discussing customer information within the office ensure that you are being respectful and demonstrating ACC's values.
- ✓ Raise concerns and debrief privately with a team leader or trusted colleague.
- ✓ Consider whether the information being asked for by a third party is information we can share.
- ✓ Never disclose other people's personal information for your own purposes.

3.6 We commit to storing information with reasonable safeguards against loss and disclosure and retaining it in line with legislative requirements

What this means for you
<p>We typically hold records for 75 years from the date of the last action on a file, to ensure that records are available should claims need to be reactivated or issues arise in relation to decisions made in the past.</p> <p>If we identify we have received information that is not relevant to our functions, where reasonably practicable, it will be returned or destroyed securely.</p> <p>Recognise the trust that people place in us, which comes with an obligation to care for and respect the information they have shared and use data management processes and tools that provide the appropriate level of security to protect, transfer and store data and information</p>
Doing it right
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Make every effort to ensure personal information remains protected and secure when you are working remotely, this includes when working from home. • Try to work as much as possible electronically. Hard copies of files can be lost or seen by others if being accessed in public places. • Create an environment in your team discussions and decision-making where information management practices are understood and practiced.
Doing it wrong
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Jane decides to complete some work during her morning train commute. Jane opens a document that contains personal information and starts reading it. People around her can see and read the document.
Tips and tricks
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ Make sure the correct classification tags are on documents. ✓ Conduct regular back-ups of data. ✓ Use password protecting electronic documents that contain significant or sensitive information (for example, health records, financial information). ✓ Avoid transporting physical documents, except where necessary. ✓ Only use our authorised cloud computing services that comply with government standards.

- ✓ Use the document destruction bins for secure document and information disposal.

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3.7 We have a clear, consistent process for reporting, managing and escalating privacy incidents

<p>What this means for you</p>
<p>If you think there has been a privacy incident, you must report this to the Privacy Team immediately. We're required by law to report any serious privacy breaches to the Office of the Privacy Commissioner and to notify affected individuals within a limited timeframe.</p> <p>Reporting allows us to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • fix the problem - where a privacy incident occurs, we will do our best to rectify the situation • learn from the incident and get better • where appropriate, make breach notifications in accordance with the Privacy Act 2020 <p>Anyone can report a potential incident to the Privacy Team at any stage. Reporting privacy incidents allows us to learn from any mistakes and helps us to prevent breaches happening in the future. We aim to grow from them and will take any learnings from the incident to continuously improve our approach to privacy.</p> <p>To report breaches, use the Privacy Reporting Tool or if the matter is urgent or a serious privacy breach that may be notifiable call the Hotline.</p>
<p>Doing it right</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • You notice there appears to be an issue with email address verifications which means emails have been defaulting to an older address. You raise with your team leader <i>and</i> follow the procedures for raising with the Privacy team and lodging an incident. • You have been added into a group chat where colleagues are discussing personal information of customers. You immediately alert your people leader. (It might be appropriate to use OK2Say or follow the Protected Disclosures Guidelines if you didn't feel comfortable going to your people leader)
<p>Doing it wrong</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • You've been added to a group chat where colleagues are discussing personal information of our customers. You don't participate in the chat, but you also don't report it. • You send an email to the incorrect recipient. The email contains some personal information of a customer. You identify your error and re-send the message to the correct address but don't report it. • You leave your computer unattended whilst working from home, there is personally identifiable information on your screens visible to your flat mate.
<p>Tips and tricks</p>

Privacy incidents may include:

- ✓ Accidental disclosure to third parties and disclosures to third parties without authority or a lawful reason for doing so.
- ✓ Access of customer files by our people where there is no good business reason for access.
- ✓ Sharing customer personal information with other ACC people without a good business reason.
- ✓ Using personal information for reasons other than its intended purpose.
- ✓ Personal information systems are hacked or accessed unlawfully, either by external third parties or by ACC people.
- ✓ Near misses (where an incident was narrowly averted).

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3.8 Care of personal information is embedded in everything we do

What this means for you
<p>Making sure we take care of personal information is part of everything we do at ACC – we think about how we’re caring for personal information when we do our day-to-day work, develop processes and policy, design systems and communicate with each other and external organisations.</p> <p>New Zealanders must be able to reasonably expect their personal information is collected, used, and shared respectfully, and adequately protected.</p> <p>All ACC people need to keep up to date with best practice and training modules on privacy and know how to raise privacy issues.</p> <p>The process of ensuring privacy is embedded throughout the product or service lifecycle from design to disposal and everything else we do at ACC is often referred to as Privacy by Design and should be incorporated into activities where personal information is collected and used. This may include continuous improvement activities, procurement, or policy development. At the center of the design for a product, service, system, or process that uses personal information should be the mitigation of individual harm and adverse impact of any privacy breach or misuse of information.</p>
Doing it right
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Be kaitiaki (guardians) of personal information by building privacy by design into our systems and process, with guidance from the Privacy team, at the very start of the process. • Mitigate risks by ensuring that privacy recommendations or requirements are completed before your project goes live. • Dane finds an article about a privacy issue at another government agency. He raises this with his manager to ensure that ACC can mitigate this risk. • Not using real customer or claims information when designing training material and using Sandbox environments where possible • Only using de-identified data for research projects where possible.
Doing it wrong
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Designing a new business system or process without assessing the privacy risks involved at the start of the project. • Talking about the latest interesting case you were working on with a friend in the pub and discussing information that would identify the customer. • You suspect a colleague has made a potential breach and it has not been reported, you don’t raise it with anyone as you’re unsure if it’s your responsibility.
Tips and tricks

- ✓ Privacy needs to be part of the planning of any new or updated product, service, system, or process. Privacy considerations should help drive the design rather than being bolted on at the end to address a few privacy risks.
- ✓ Protection and security of personal information should be considered for every stage of the information lifecycle: collection, storage and security, use, access and correction, disclosure, retention, and disposal
- ✓ When you do have to discuss personal information, think about what information is relevant and necessary to share.

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3.9 We commit to ensuring we have effective policies and processes which reflect current best practice standards

What this means for you
ACC are committed to a programme of continuous improvement and has policies, guidelines and processes that have been designed to reflect the most up-to-date best practice standards. These documents govern how our people should handle the personal information in our care.
Doing it right
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Leaders are current with processes and guidelines, and they take accountability to ensure their teams are too. • Checking the privacy hub regularly for any updates or refreshers. • If you come across a policy or guideline that is out of date, please raise this with your Team Leader.

ACC Privacy Maturity Plan 2016/17

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1 Purpose of the ACC Privacy Maturity Action Plan

Effective management of our customers' information is an essential element in creating a unique partnership with all New Zealanders. Our customers need to have confidence that their personal information managed by ACC is collected appropriately, stored securely and only disclosed with appropriate authority and that they can access it when they need it. Better management of personal information across the information lifecycle is fundamental to delivering on our Vision and Values, as well as, improving customer outcomes, and building public trust and confidence.

ACC collects and uses personal information from a large number of people and entities, including clients, providers and business customers. Our relationship with personal information is complex – some information is compelled by law (eg through the collection of levies or providing medical records for a claim) and some is volunteered (eg when a client submits a claim or a provider seeks payment for services). Some information comes directly from our customers and some comes to us through third parties. We then use that information to make decisions about a person's individual circumstances and in some cases we need to share it with others. Given this complex set of responsibilities, a wide range of customer expectations can arise.

But fundamental to all of our relationships is the need for our customers to have confidence that their personal information is collected appropriately, stored securely and accurately, only disclosed with appropriate authority and that they can access it when they need it. Building that confidence is an essential element in ACC creating a unique partnership with all New Zealanders.

Focus for next four years - embedding and maturing our approach to privacy

As part of putting the customer at the core of our services and building customer confidence, ACC needs to continue to mature from a culture of risk management to our developing culture as responsible information stewards. ACC's Statement of Intent 2015-2019 promises we will *'Improve the way we protect our customers' personal information'* to ensure:¹

Our people respect and protect customer information as if it were their own.

Processes and systems are designed to minimise the possibility of privacy breaches occurring.

This four year action plan formalises our approach to build on our progress and continue to improve our privacy maturity between now and 2020. It will embed a culture of information stewardship that aligns with the other changes we are making to improve our customers' experiences.

2 Building our Privacy Maturity as Part of Shaping our Future

ACC is in a period of significant change. A new organisational vision, values and customer experience approaches have been introduced. Our Target Operating Model puts the customer at the centre of our processes and will fundamentally transform the way ACC collects, uses, stores and discloses information. It also provides customers with better ways to access and correct their information. We will achieve this through the implementation of the Shaping our Future strategy and our Transformation Programme.

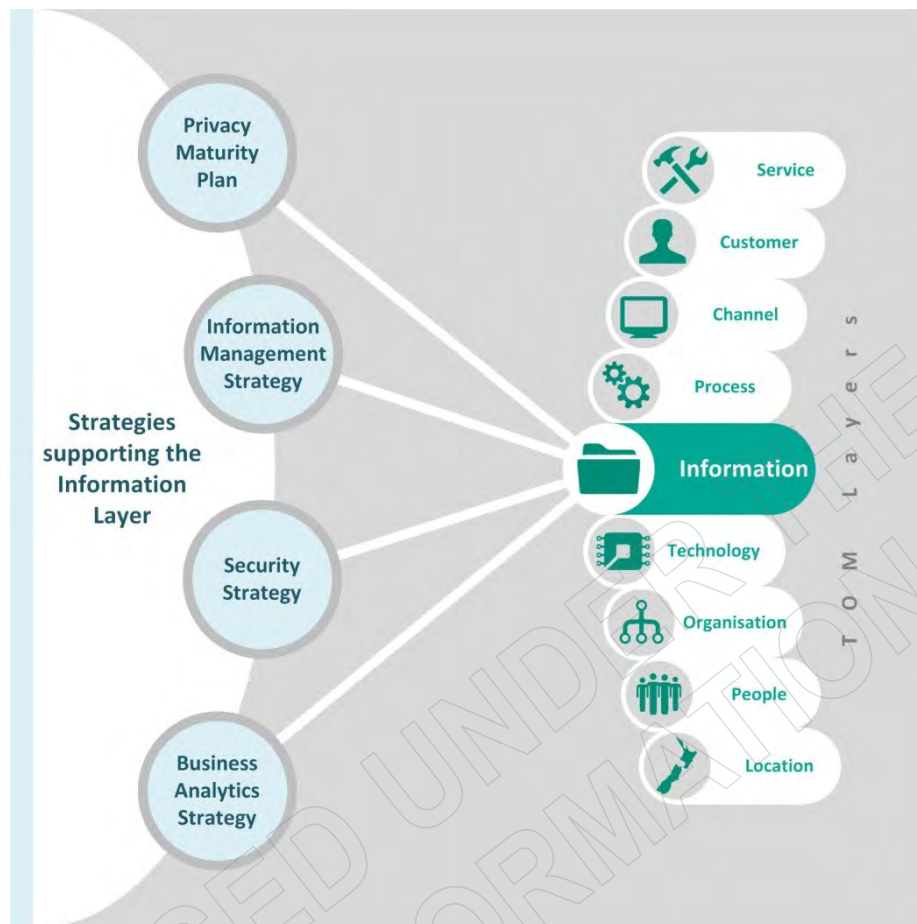
There are nine layers in the Target Operating Model – Service, Customer, Digital channels, Processes, Information, Technology, Organisation, People and Location. We will embed privacy in the design of all systems and processes that are developed under the layers of the Target Operating Model. Significant investment is planned in years 4 and 5 to establish an effective technology foundation that will reduce the number of privacy breaches associated with manual handling. It will put the customer at the centre of our processes and fundamentally transform the way ACC collects, uses, stores and discloses information, as well as providing customers with significantly improved access to and correction of their information.

The Information Layer describes how our data will be organised, distributed and shared, internally and with our customers. Our aim is to have accurate and timely data, which is specific, organised for a purpose, and is presented with context so that it has meaning and relevance.

The key features of the Information Layer include:

- A focus on continuous improvement, supported by the analysis of our customers' feedback and satisfaction, behavioural information, and data
- Sourcing information from trusted sources such as Inland Revenue, the Companies Office, and Ministry of Health to improve the quality of our data while ensuring we operate efficiently
- Identifying our principal data sources and avoiding replication of data between systems
- Only holding data that we need
- Ensuring our core systems are our single source of truth and provide a complete view of each customer.

The following diagram shows the relationship between the Privacy Maturity Action Plan and other key elements that define the Information Layer of the Target Operating Model.



This action plan outlines how we will embed privacy through the Transformation Programme and our broader operations to build our privacy maturity. The actions we take under this plan will be integrated with the enterprise-wide work to improve our overall Information Management Maturity.

3 Assessment of Current State

An independent review in 2012 highlighted significant concerns with how (at that time) we were managing the personal information. We have made significant improvements and investment in our privacy performance since then including the establishment of a dedicated privacy team, and client information teams to manage information access requests. Privacy policies have been documented to support best practice, and system design processes include a preliminary investigation of privacy risk.

In December 2014, we commissioned a follow-up review on our progress since 2012.² The review noted that ACC had made substantial improvements. Frontline staff, in particular, now have a much better understanding of privacy, how to protect personal information and the processes required to mitigate against the risk of privacy breaches.

The review concluded:

We are not aware of any other New Zealand agencies or organisations that have put in a comparable level of dedicated resourcing and attention to Privacy protection, and issue detection, within such a short timeframe. This is commendable.

However, privacy breaches are still occurring. Our processes are still manually intensive and rely on the attention of individual staff members to avoid mistakes being made. In the year to April 2016, the monthly average of privacy breaches using ACC's own definition ranged from 10-21. Ongoing focus at an enterprise level is required to maintain and improve this performance.

*Privacy by Design*³ has been adopted as a core design principle within the Transformation Programme and all other change being implemented across ACC. Privacy by Design is an approach to protecting privacy by embedding it in the design of new technologies and business practices. It involves building in privacy into the design specifications and architecture of new systems and processes.

Privacy Maturity Assessment Framework

In August 2014, the Government Chief Privacy Officer (**GCPO**) issued core expectations of government agencies that represent good practice for privacy management and governance. The GCPO also issued the Privacy Maturity Assessment Framework (**PMAF**) to support agencies in meeting the core expectations.

The PMAF enables an organisation to determine its current level of maturity and assess whether this is appropriate, given the nature and risks associated with managing personal information. The Framework assesses privacy in nine focus areas and allows agencies to rate their performance against a five-point maturity scale. Details are contained in **Appendix 1**.

An independent assessment against the PMAF confirmed that ACC is measurably ahead of the rest of the Public Sector in overall privacy maturity and this has been confirmed in discussions with the GCPO.

The April 2015 independent assessment showed that our privacy culture and breach and incident management capability are already *Embedded*, which aligns to expectations for an agency of our size and complexity. This reflects the significant focus and investment we have placed in these areas since 2012.

The areas which were assessed as needing improvement in maturity were:

- Information Management
- Assurance
- Business Processes
- Implementation of the Information Privacy Principles (IPPs) from the Privacy Act 1993.

These areas were assessed as being weaker predominantly because we did not have privacy embedded into the design of our processes and systems. It should be noted that since the independent PMAF assessment of 2015, changes have been made to these improve these areas that will contribute to an increase in their privacy maturity. For example, establishing the Information Governance Group and formalising the information strategy will uplift the level of maturity from Ad Hoc to Defined.

Our key areas of focus for the next four years will therefore be:

- agreeing an enterprise-wide approach to information management. Specifically appreciating information as a business asset rather than a by-product of business processes
- implementing an enterprise-wide approach to privacy assurance, and enhancing its effectiveness through building on the basics of the three lines of defence model
- improving business processes through consideration of the value of the information that we manage
- enhancing our maturity across all the IPPs through effective and detailed policies, and using customer feedback to identify improvement opportunities.

Our assessed current state against each of the maturity focus areas is reflected in the diagram at the end of section five of this document.

4 Actions





The systemic changes that will be delivered by our Transformation Programme are key to sustainably improving our privacy performance. They will fundamentally transform the way ACC collects, uses, stores and discloses information, as well as provide our customers with significantly improved abilities to access and correct their information. This will be complemented by the delivery of our Strategic Change Portfolio⁴ and our ongoing programme of other continuous improvement activities.






This will enable us to achieve our strategic objectives relating to privacy, including increased privacy maturity and improved breach performance across our operations.

The deliverables below reflect the key areas of change that will improve our privacy maturity and performance across the next four years. Initiatives have been mapped against the element of the PMAF that they will have the greatest improvement impact against.

5 Measuring our Success

Privacy Breaches

Privacy breaches are a key indicator of the success of our privacy investment. We will continue to track and report on privacy breaches through our published external accountability reporting and internal performance reporting. This will ensure that we remain accountable at an enterprise level to continually improve our privacy performance and provide us with a benchmark for measuring the success of our initiatives.

From 1 July 2016, ACC will be implementing the Privacy Breach Reporting Framework (Framework) that was released by the GCPO in December 2015. The Framework gives public sector agencies a tool to identify and report on the scale and severity of privacy breaches, and assist in providing context when reporting incidents internally, or to the public through official documents. Details of the Framework are included in **Appendix 2**.

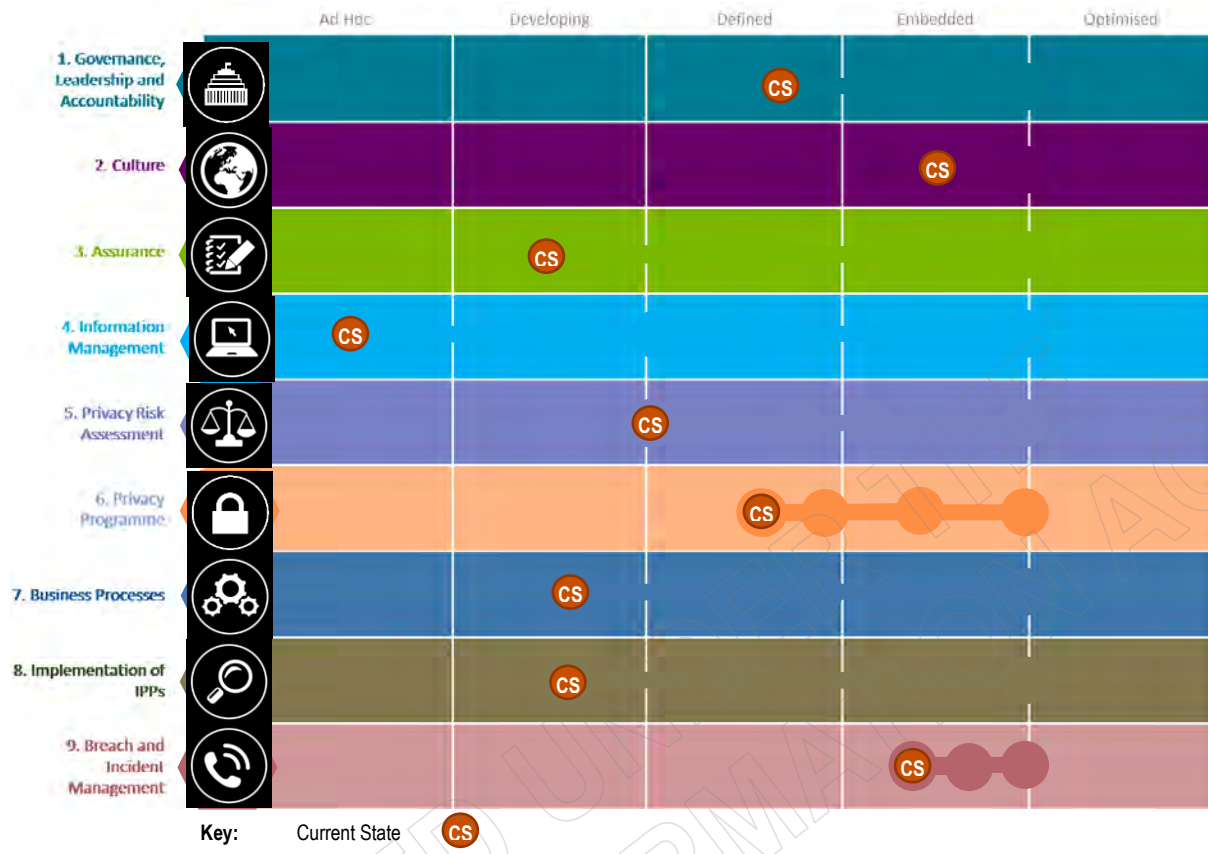

Under the Framework, a privacy breach is when an agency does not comply with one or more of the IPPs. Compared to our current breach definition, the Framework will capture a broader range of privacy incidents (including what ACC currently defines as 'non-compliance events').

Privacy Maturity Improvements







We will measure improvements in our privacy maturity through annual re-assessments against the PMAF. Our objective is to be assessed as *Embedded* against all nine elements of the PMAF by 2020. Through delivery of actions outlined above, the expected annual improvements in maturity levels against the Framework are illustrated in the following table:



6 Outcomes

By implementing the actions in this Maturity Plan, the following outcomes will be realised against the elements of the PMAF by 2020.

7 Risks and Mitigations

The following are identified risks, and possible mitigations.

- **Uncertainty about technology:** ACC's privacy performance is heavily reliant on people because processes to prevent privacy incidents are predominantly manual. If the technologies are challenging for people to adopt, this could impact on the delivery of solutions and risks of manual work-arounds as a solution to preventing privacy incidents. While ideally technology solutions will employ optimal privacy protections, they will require testing before implementation to ensure their fitness for purpose; assessment to ensure compliance with government computing standards (particularly if cloud-based); and thorough training to ensure users adopt them with minimal disruption to operations.
- **Failing to incorporate Privacy by Design:** All changes across ACC are required to incorporate Privacy by Design into system and process design. It would be difficult to retroactively apply adequate protections if they are not incorporated at the design stage. Implementation of any initiative needs to have a privacy lens applied early in the design process.
- **Staff will lose their privacy mindset:** If technology solutions are not delivered with adequate training, are not intuitive or do not assist staff to meet privacy considerations, staff may ignore or misuse them. Conversely, if staff rely on technology solutions that are not designed with full privacy protections, they will not take personal responsibility for ensuring information is protected. Mitigating this risk will require maintaining our engagement with staff about privacy and continued education about and promotion of best practice behaviour.
- **Reduced resources:** As ACC's privacy performance improves and the number of breaches reduces, there may be an inclination to decrease the privacy resources available. This could impact on the type of training for our staff to ensure a high awareness of privacy is maintained. It could impact on the analysis of privacy incidents undertaken, and the resulting initiatives to target high risk areas. Reduced resources may also impact on the assistance available to Shaping Our Future and other parts of the business to ensure Privacy by Design is considered. To mitigate this risk, it is important that these initiatives are appropriately resourced.
- **Privacy is not integrated into business planning:** Privacy processes, risks and considerations impact many areas of the business. In particular, the Information Management and Information Security areas (and accompanying strategies) are natural companions to privacy, and the Customer Feedback Strategy includes privacy feedback components. It is important that privacy is linked into all business planning processes across the organisation, so that the protection of our customers' personal information is embedded into every aspect of our operations.
- **Governance processes lessen their focus on privacy:** The significant focus and investment in privacy at ACC has contributed to our success in improving privacy culture and reducing privacy incidents. Given the number of initiatives underway over the next several years, these competing priorities may distract or reduce our attention on privacy. ACC management needs to ensure that privacy remains a priority as one of our strategic intentions.

Appendix 1 – Privacy Maturity Assessment Framework

The PMAF assesses privacy in nine focus areas, rating current performance against a five-point maturity scale. The diagram on the left below shows the nine focus areas, and the table on the right show the maturity scale and descriptions from Ad Hoc to Optimised.

Appendix 2 – Privacy Breach Reporting Framework

Government Chief Privacy Officer (**GCPO**) has developed guidance for breach reporting, which was officially launched in December 2015. The purpose of this Privacy Breach Reporting Framework (**Framework**) is to give agencies a tool to identify and report on the scale and severity of privacy breaches and near misses (where this information is requested). It may also assist agencies in providing context around privacy breaches and near misses reported internally, or to the public through official documents such as annual reports. ACC is seen by the GCPO as a leader in privacy breach reporting and was involved in the development of this Framework including using our privacy incident data to support testing and calibration of the Framework.

A privacy breach is when an agency does not comply with one or more of the IPPs set out in section 6 of the Privacy Act 1993. The matrix has seven key areas to be assessed:

- number of individuals affected
- sensitivity of the information at issue
- harm to the individual
- harm to the agency
- potential for media attention
- source of the privacy breach
- whether the information has been recovered, accessed, or able to be accessed

Each assessment response is assigned a value, the total of which determines the rating of the privacy breach. The purpose of the ratings is to provide an indication of the severity and scale of the privacy breaches occurring. Once ratings are totalled, they are allocated a Level from 1 to 5, with 5 being the most serious.

1 Policy Statement

As a Crown entity, ACC holds information on behalf of the peoples of New Zealand. The information held is related to the duties ACC is responsible for in accordance with the Accident Compensation Act 2001. These duties relate to ACC's major functions: injury prevention, rehabilitation, setting and collection of levies; assessing and paying claims and investment management. This constitutes the primary use of this information.

ACC holds a unique set of information that has significant value, not only for NZ but internationally.

Information is the only enduring asset that ACC holds and should be treated as such. This aligns with the Māori data sovereignty principle of viewing this as a treasure (Māori: taonga). In recognition of the obligations under the Treaty of Waitangi (Māori: Te Tiriti o Waitangi).

To extract the maximum value of this resource, the secondary use of information must be actively promoted and supported for secondary use which includes:

- Identifying opportunities for injury prevention initiatives
- Improving customer service by improving outcomes, efficiencies and effectiveness
- Sharing information for external use in support of insights and research related to accidents, injuries, treatments
- Ensuring information is available and representative of the peoples of NZ, including Māori, minorities and marginalised groups to facilitate and support these communities
- Partnering with representative groups to promote, support and advise on the appropriate use of ACC information
- To ensure that information is fit for purpose, ACC is committed to establishing, maintaining and monitoring modern information management practices to ensure they meet both primary and secondary needs. This includes meeting legal compliance, accountability requirements and stakeholder expectations.

2 Alignment with Government

As a crown entity, ACC is expected to conform and adhere to government policies and practices related to information management as specified by appointed officials. In addition, as ACC is viewed as part of the health and disability sector, we also need to conform to specific sector requirements.

These are described in more detail in Appendix 3.3.

3 Policy Objective

We are committed to establishing modern information governance and management practices that meet our customer expectations, ongoing business needs, security, privacy and legal requirements including:

- Capturing only relevant, and applicable, information
- Securing and storing our information appropriately, recognising that we are a customer-centric organisation
- Documenting actions and decisions as required for legislative, governance and legal reasons
- Managing information as a strategic corporate asset

All our information management practices are delivered in accordance with the principles set out in this policy, and its supporting standards and procedures. ACC is committed to continuous improvement in our corporate information policies, processes and standards.

4 Policy Scope

This policy is intended for all our people, including our board members, consultants, contractors and organisations (including vendors and other third parties) engaged to undertake work on behalf of ACC.

This policy covers all information that we create, ingest, receive, manage, store and share as part of conducting our business.

5 Policy Principles

Our Information Management principles are the foundations for the way that we use information within ACC.

Our information must be managed, secured, and maintained as per our Information Management principles. We must also comply with all relevant legislation and government standards.

Personal and health information makes up a significant part of our information.

The ACC Privacy Policy sets out additional requirements for storage and use of this information and must be read in conjunction with this policy when dealing with personal and health information.

4.1 Our Information is a strategic asset and we actively manage it

Our Information Governance Group (IGG) must ensure that our information assets are professionally managed. This supports our objectives, principles, and the obligations set out in the IGG Terms of Reference.

Active management means:

- We have senior leaders setting strategy, and making sure we are sufficiently resourced to manage our information assets in a consistent, integrated way
- We use our information assets to deliver insights and enable smarter business decisions
- Our change management processes consider, and actively manage, information management risks at both design and implementation stages
- All staff must ensure the information they use is accurate and fit for purpose.

4.2 Our information has clear ownership

All our business-critical information assets must be assigned a Steward (business owner) by subject area, and at least one Custodian (information caretaker) as per our Information Stewards and Custodians Standard.

Stewards and Custodians must ensure that our information is cared for (actively managed) throughout its lifetime. They must also ensure that information access is only granted where needed for the particular role and is disposed of (destroyed or archived) at the end of its lifetime in accordance with our approved disposal authorities.

Clear ownership means:

- We must ensure all staff understand and are able to manage our information within their role
- We must ensure our information is fit for purpose and aligned with the strategic direction set by the Information Governance Group (IGG)
- All our key information assets have defined business owners (Stewards) with agreed delegation of authority
- Stewards are responsible for making decisions related to their assigned information assets
- Custodians support Stewards by ensuring the information they are responsible for is fit for purpose, meets primary and secondary needs, is readily accessible by those that need it and is trustworthy.

4.3 We make our Information fit for purpose

We must manage information to ensure it is fit for purpose, consistently described, trustworthy and meets all needs. We all have a responsibility to conform with required quality requirements by, taking ownership of the information in our care.

Fit for purpose means:

- We protect the value of information against misuse, misinterpretation, unnecessary access restrictions or failure to maintain its quality
- Active stewardship of our information ensures that it remains fit for purpose. To do so it must be accessible and complete, well described so that it is understood, and can be used with confidence in support of both internal and external:
 - Operational use
 - Evidence-based decision making
 - Research
 - Reporting
 - Analytics, and
 - Data Mining

- Information must be periodically reviewed to ensure compliance with all relevant legislation and standards as shown Appendix 1
- Good archiving and disposal practices ensure our information is compliant with the requirements of the Public Records Act 2005.

4.4 We make our information Accessible, yet Secure

We enable the sharing of our information to make best use of the information assets we hold and promote public and government confidence in our information.

We protect the ethical use, confidentiality, integrity and accessibility of information, through active management and adherence to the principles of our Privacy Policy, Information Security Policy and related Standards.

Accessible, yet Secure means:

- We comply with our obligations under the New Zealand Open Data Charter
- We enable appropriate, and prevent inappropriate, access and reuse of our data assets
- We improve the effectiveness and efficiency of work by allowing people to discover, use, and share information
- We enable better, evidence based, decision making
- When we share information externally, we ensure appropriate approvals and/or formal agreements are in place, and where relevant will seek advice from the ACC Ethics Panel.
- We minimise the risk of uncontrolled release of our information, and the resulting harm arising to our clients, business and personnel
- The privacy and confidentiality expectations of all stakeholders are met.

4.5 Our Information is simplified by design, and we standardise it for reuse

Our information architecture and Enterprise Information Management (EIM) Strategy provides the big picture of how our information hangs together. It is designed to provide visibility, promote reuse, integration and efficiency.

Simplified and standardised information means:

- A well-managed information architecture that allows people to discover, use and share information
- It provides a lean, agile information environment that results in more efficient use of information assets, and promotes cost effective business outcomes
- The concept of 'create once, use many times' meaning duplication and reinvention is minimised, which allows us to significantly reduce the cost and effort in creating and managing duplicate information

4.6 We all share a common understanding of how we work

All our people and contractors understand their responsibilities as set out in this policy and its supporting policies, standards, processes and guidelines.

We all work to deliver our information management goals and best practice outcomes for all our customers.

6 Accountabilities

The ACC Board is responsible for ensuring ACC's compliance with the directions to support an all of government approach including the current direction on Information and Communication Technologies (ICT).

To support the Board, each Executive member is accountable for understanding and compliance with this policy and its supporting policies and standards within their business area.

This includes effective implementation of information management practices across our work activities to ensure the principles of this policy are understood and that the relevant legislation and standards are complied with.

The Deputy Chief Executive – Enterprise Change Delivery is accountable for the operational implementation and monitoring of this policy.

7 Responsibilities

All employees are collectively responsible for Information Management.

Where practicable these changes will be managed through standards and best practice guidelines.

Complying with all policies and procedures is a requirement outlined in the Code of Conduct. Behaviour or actions that are investigated and found to be in breach of the Code of Conduct may result in disciplinary action. Refer to Code of Conduct for further information.

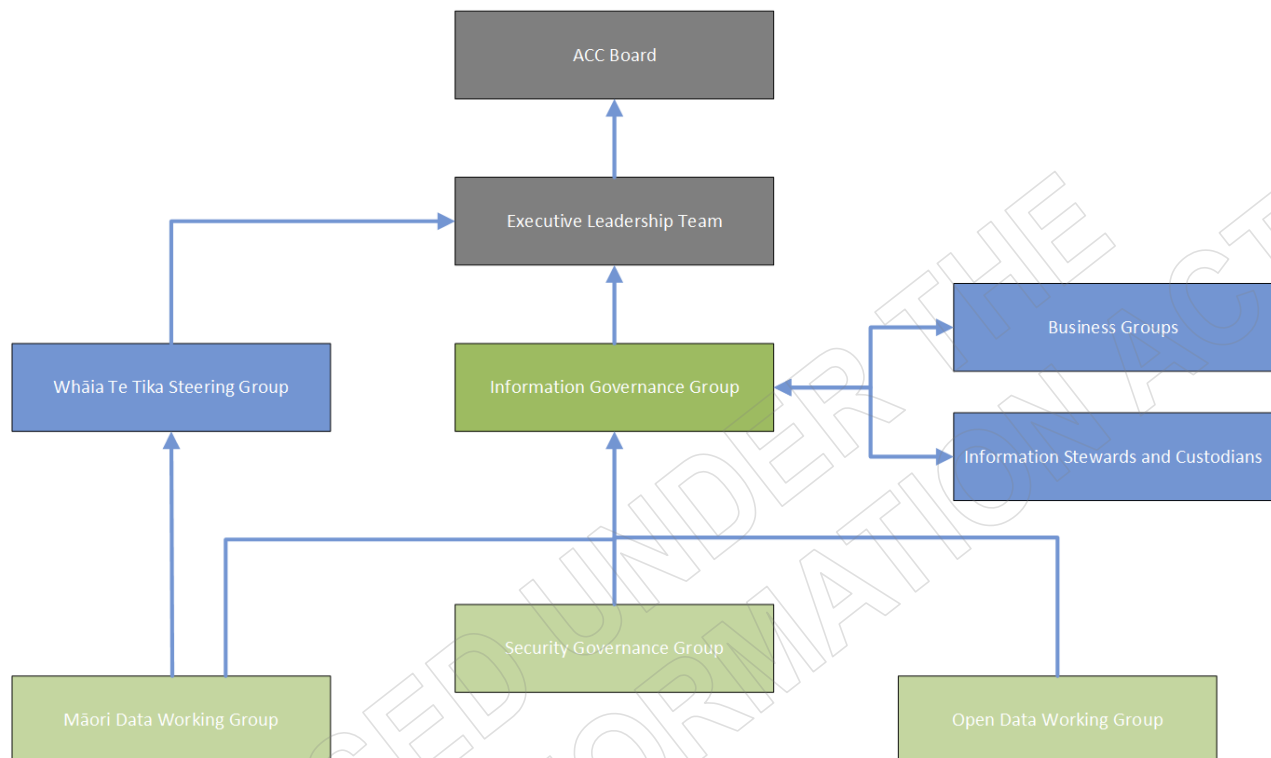

All-of-Government Official Functions (www.digital.govt.nz)

The NZ Government has established functional leads who are charged with developing and improving designated areas across government. The roles are delegated to specific chief executives by the Public Service Commissioner.

The roles are:

1. Government Chief Digital Officer (GCDO) oversees the development and management of digital for the state sector. The GCDO is responsible for:
 - setting digital policy and standards
 - improving investments

- establishing and managing services
 - developing capability
 - system assurance (assuring digital government outcomes)
2. Government Chief Data Steward (GCDS) supports the use of data as a resource across government to help deliver better services to New Zealanders. The GCDS is the government functional lead for data and ensures that government agencies have the capability and right skills to maximise the value of data. This is achieved through setting data standards and establishing common capabilities, developing data policy and strategy, and planning across the state sector. Focus has been on:
- Co-developing a Data Stewardship Framework to enable agencies to manage data as a strategic asset and benchmark their data maturity
 - Leading the government's commitment to accelerate the release of open data, including the implementation of the International Open Data Charter
 - Developing data governance across the system through evolving approaches to data ethics and Māori data governance.
3. Government Chief Information Security Officer (GCISO) role strengthens Government decision making around Information Security and supports a system-wide uplift in security practice. The GCISO is the government functional lead for information security. The GCISO's work includes:
- coordinating the government's approach to information security
 - identifying systemic risks and vulnerabilities
 - improving coordination between ICT operations and security roles, particularly around the digital government agenda
 - establishing minimum information security standards and expectations
 - improving support to agencies managing complex information security challenges.
4. Government Chief Privacy Officer (GCPO) leads an all-of-government approach to privacy to raise public sector privacy maturity and capability. The role sits within the Digital Public Service branch of the Department of Internal Affairs, reporting to the Government Chief Digital Officer. The GCPO is the practice lead for privacy and supports government agencies to meet their privacy responsibilities and improve their privacy practices. The GCPO is responsible for:
- providing leadership by setting the vision for privacy across government
 - building capability by supporting agencies to lift their capability to meet their privacy responsibilities
 - providing assurance on public sector privacy performance
 - engaging with the Office of the Privacy Commissioner and New Zealanders about privacy.

Statistics NZ (data.govt.nz)

Statistics NZ (as GCDO) is responsible for overseeing official government statistics. Tier 1 statistics are New Zealand's most important statistics, and are essential to help the Government, business, and members of the public to make informed decisions and monitor the state and progress of New Zealand. [Tier 1 statistics](#) describe New Zealand's economy, environment, population, society, culture, international relations, and civil and political rights. Tier 1 statistics are also used by a range of organisations to develop new services and products.

One of the 162 Tier 1 statistics is the incidence of injuries annually produced by Statistics NZ using ACC and MoH data.

As ACC supplies data to produce a Tier 1 statistic, ACC must ensure that the Tier 1 statistic is of good quality and has integrity. Producers of Tier 1 statistics must adhere to the [Principles and protocols for producers of Tier 1 statistics](#). Tier 1 statistics must be presented impartially and clearly without judgement and must be managed in such a way to ensure that the statistics are free from undue influence.

Ministry of Health

The Health Information Standards Organisation (HISO) with the Ministry of Health supports and promotes the development and adoption of fit-for-purpose health information standards for the New Zealand health system. HISO works with health providers and shared services organisations, clinical and consumer groups, software vendors and industry bodies, the academic community, the wider government sector and other standards development organisations. It also supports *He Korowai Oranga: Māori Health Strategy* for the effective delivery of health and disability services to Māori and represent the interests of all New Zealanders as consumers of health services and stakeholders in the health system.

HISO links with the international standards community through Standards NZ, SNOMED International for SNOMED CT, and through HL7 New Zealand for HL7 standards.

As a participant in the Health & Disability Sector, ACC is expected to adhere and support the standards produced by HISO.

Inbound and Outbound Document Checks

Supporting Information



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Background / Guiding Principles

The overarching principle for any document checks is that it is everyone's responsibility to ensure the correct and relevant information is attached to a claim, and/or released from ACC.

Whilst many of these checks are administrative in nature, they can only be executed when clear and thorough instruction is provided by the Recovery Team member. Both parties play an important role in ensuring inbound and outbound checks do not result in privacy breaches.

Redaction

For the following, "redaction" means to black-out information from a document using Adobe Pro, or to remove completely (e.g. by physically removing a document).

Recovery Teams should email redaction instructions to Recovery Administration.

Withholding

The term "withholding" applies to instances where the client or representative has requested personal information under [Information Privacy Principle 6](#). Under Principle 6, agencies are required to provide a reason for why information has been withheld.

Where information is being sent to a provider or other party for assessment purposes, agencies are not legally required to provide withholding reasons.

Please see [this page](#) for more information about withholding.

Roles and Responsibilities

The overarching principle for any document checks is that it is everyone’s responsibility to ensure the correct and relevant information is attached to a claim, and/or released from ACC.

Inbound Checks

Types of inbound check

Inbound Document Management are often the first point in the inbound checking process and are responsible for an initial 3-point check. This ensures that information is uploaded to the correct file. Due to the superficial nature of the 3-point check, it remains the responsibility of the Recovery Team members to check any uploaded documentation for third-party or irrelevant information and ensure it is redacted.

Recovery Teams should task redaction to Administration.

3-point

Purpose	Accountable roles
Ensure incoming documents are uploaded to the correct client's record	Inbound Document Management Team

Examples of 3-point check

Information	Action
Medical notes from provider contain 3 data points – client name/address, date of birth and claim number - that match with the client's Eos record	Upload the documents
Unable to match 3-data points in medical notes from provider	Investigate further. Look for other data points that might match, e.g. the provider involved, the injury type, a signature. Call the provider. If still unable to match, discuss with TL

Third-party

Purpose	Accountable roles
To ensure that no personally identifiable third-party information is on the document that has been uploaded to the claim	Recovery Teams This would normally be the person who receives the <i>You have new mail</i> task from the Inbound Document Management Team

Examples of third-party check

Information	Action
GP notes contain another patient's medical certificate	Email Recovery Administration to remove, redact and re-upload (put in document description that unrelated information was removed on receipt). A Recovery or Administration TL will need to remove original document
GP notes contain other individuals' random claim numbers or ACCID numbers	Email Recovery Administration to remove, redact and re-upload (put in document description that unrelated information was removed on receipt). A Recovery or Administration TL will need to remove original document

ACC requests an Independence Allowance assessment report – there is a section that relates to another client Send the report back to author and ask them to submit an amended report

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Relevance Check

Purpose	Accountable roles
To ensure that only information relevant is uploaded to the claim	Recovery Teams

Examples of relevancy check

Information	Action
Client has an Anterior Cruciate Ligament (knee) injury – a DHB assessment outlines the details of a historic sensitive claims event	Where it is <i>clearly</i> irrelevant, email Recovery Administration to remove, redact and re-upload (put in document description that unrelated information was removed on receipt). TL will need to remove original document
Client has a claim for a broken leg – medical notes contain cervical smear test results	Where it is <i>clearly</i> irrelevant, email Recovery Administration to remove, redact and re-upload (put in document description that unrelated information was removed on receipt). TL will need to remove original document
Client has a thoracic injury and ACC requests an orthopaedic assessment – the report contains references to bi-lateral knee replacement	Refer the report back to author to determine relevance

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Outbound Checks

Whilst many of these checks are administrative in nature, they can only be executed when clear and thorough instruction has been provided by the Recovery Team member. Both Recovery Administration and the Recovery Teams play an important role in ensuring outbound checks do not result in privacy breaches.

It is always important to consider the recipient of the information when undertaking an outbound check and as this has a bearing on the type of action taken.

Information that is not relevant for a provider (e.g. for an assessment referral pack) is not 'withheld', it is simply not provided. In these cases there is no need to use withholding grounds from the Privacy Act to justify why we have redacted something. However, when a client requests their own information, we need to tell them why we have withheld any information.

Third-Party

Information about client's family members, e.g. Oranga Tamariki notes about a family conference	Consider if it's applicable to release in context, otherwise redact – no need to provide withholding reason	Consider whether it is applicable to release in context, otherwise withhold under s29(1)(a) and redact
Next of kin information	Redact – no need to provide a withholding reason	Leave in

Relevance check

Purpose	Accountable roles
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To ensure that only information relevant to the claim is sent Recovery Teams and Recovery Administration

Determining relevance can be difficult to do, however, if it feels wrong, it probably is

Examples of relevance check

Information	Sending to provider	Sending to client
Client has a rotator cuff (shoulder) injury - clinical notes mention PTSD	If clearly not relevant, redact – no need to provide a withholding reason	Leave in Good practice would be to permanently remove this from the file
Client has a Treatment Injury for a hernia - GP notes contain references to asthma, eczema and diabetes	If clearly not relevant, redact – no need to provide a withholding reason	Leave in Good practice would be to permanently remove this from the file
Client has an Anterior Cruciate Ligament (knee) injury – a DHB assessment outlines the details of a historic sensitive claims event	If clearly not relevant, redact – no need to provide a withholding reason	Leave in Good practice would be to permanently remove this from the file
Client has a concussion injury – clinical notes refer to a torn ankle ligament injury	If clearly not relevant, redact – no need to provide a withholding reason	Leave in Good practice would be to permanently remove this from the file

Other Party Check

To check for any other relevant withholding reasons (Sections 27-30 of the Privacy Act). Request for medical notes being requested from Auckland DHB. During Smart Gate check, it is found that the email address is for Capital and Coast	Change email address. Establish how error occurred. Advise TL if recurring multiple times from same person (for learning opportunities)

Housekeeping Check

Purpose	Accountable roles
To ensure outbound documentation meets quality standards	Recovery Teams and Recovery Administration

Letter is not signed	Fix and sign letter (to prevent delays in information getting sent)
Letter is not on letterhead	Fix letter (to prevent delays in information getting sent)

Email contains misspellings or poor grammar	Fix or return to tasker – advise TL if recurring multiple times from same person (for learning opportunities)

This document is a guide to requesting medical notes on a claim. It includes the steps that must be followed to ensure only specific information relating to a cover, support, or treatment decision is requested. This is essential to ensure we comply with the requirements of the Privacy Act 2020 and the Health Information Privacy Code 2020.

It is important to only request necessary information because there are also financial implications for ACC if we request too much information. That's because ACC pays for medical notes through the KonnectNet system SureMed via three request types which are charged at different rates.

When Client Administration send a notes request to a GP through SureMed, they must choose one of the below three request types: The request type they select is based on the information that is provided by Recovery Team Members in the NGCM – Request for Clinical Records e-form.

Using the right code means we can ensure the most cost-effective option is being used where possible.

In many cases, the 'Specific Piece of Information for a Claim' request (up to three pieces of information) should be the most appropriate. This is the most cost-effective for ACC and the simplest for GPs to action.

We should not default to requesting all consultation notes on a claim. We need to check what specific information is required for the claim (e.g what services ACC has been billed for) and request that information accordingly.

SureMed Request Types

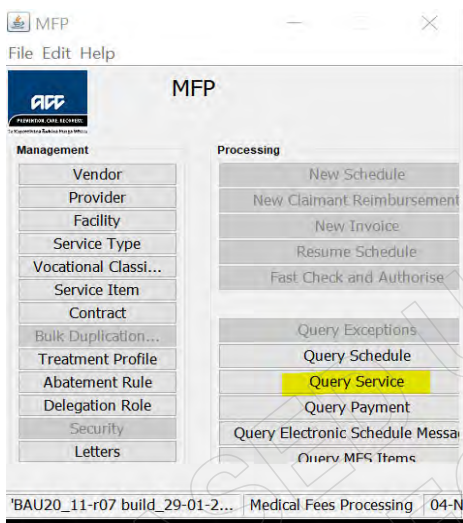
- **Specific Piece of Information for a Claim (Up to three pieces of information).** You may specify up to three specific pieces of information for a single claim/injury. (For example, two consultations notes, 1 x-ray)
- **Single Body Part/Injury Request.** These are medical notes to support incapacity and ongoing entitlements. You can use this to obtain detailed information on a single body part only (or condition when considering mental injury or treatment injury).
- **Specialised Claims or Multiple Claims/Injuries. This is for specialised claims, eg sensitive claims, mental injury, work related gradual process, treatment injury.** It is also for entitlements that need to be assessed against more than one claim, eg surgical intervention where the client has multiple claims related to requested surgical site. You can use this to obtain detailed information on up to three body parts (or conditions when considering mental injury or treatment injury).

Process

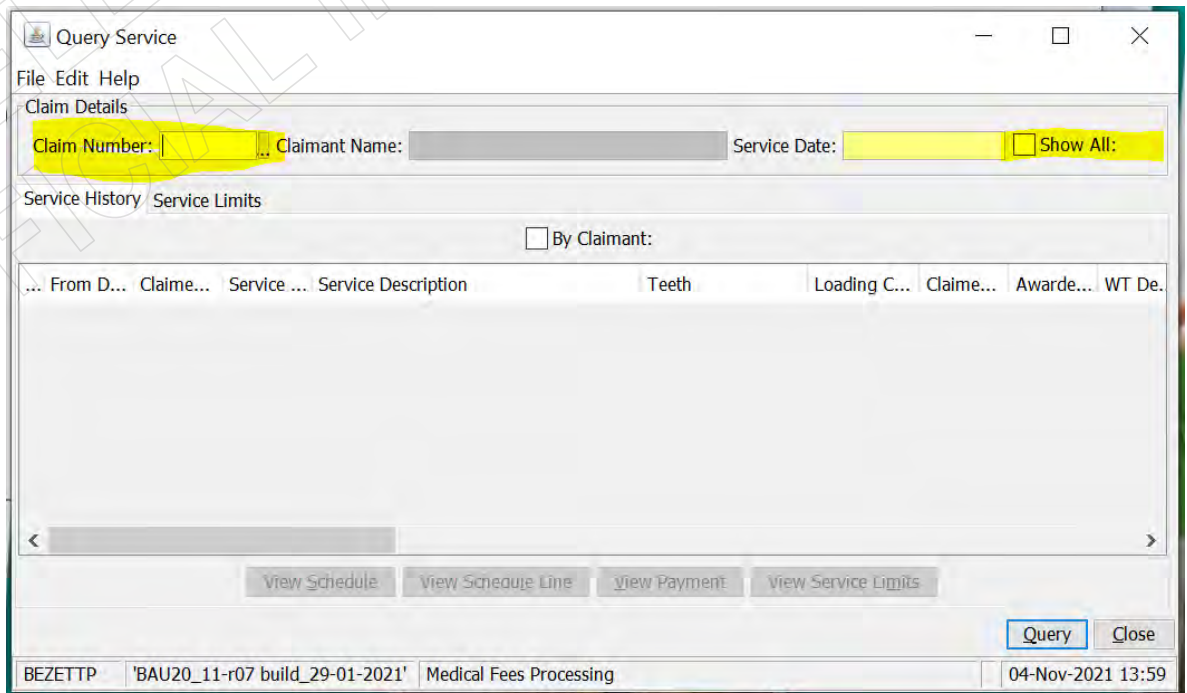
1. Before making a request, check the information has not already been requested or available. Always check in Eos what medical documents are already on the claim file - in many cases, ACC may already have the relevant medical notes. Below is an example of a claim that has the imaging and clinical services consultations on the claim file.

2. Check to see what services ACC has been billed for under the claim. To do this, go to MFP and click on "Query Service"



3. Enter the Claim number and tick the 'Show All' box.



- This will give you a list of the services ACC has been billed for on the claim. In the example below, there has been 1 x GP consultation, 2 x X-rays and 2 x Clinical Services Assessments paid for under this claim. (Note: there can sometimes be multiple charges on one date)

- For the example above, as the X-rays and the Clinical Services consultations are already on ACC's claim file you would only need to request 1 x GP note from 27 September.

NB If the client has seen an Allied Health Provider, for example Physiotherapy, Chiropractor or Hand Therapist, you will need to request these notes separately from the Allied Health Provider

- To do this you need be very specific when you complete the systems steps for completing the **NGCM – Request for Clinical Records** e-form with the instructions for the Client Administration Team. **Please ensure you are specific with the dates of what medical notes/consultations are required.**
- Below are the steps for entering the document details into the e-form which goes to Client Administration. If you're **only requesting specific documents**, please refer to the highlighted steps.

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SYSTEM STEPS - Creating Information Request Tasks

1. If the Vendor you want to request clinical records from is:
 - Already a Participant on the claim:
 - Select the appropriate Vendor
 - Select OK
 - Go to Step 5
 - Not a Participant on the claim:
 - Select Add.
 - In the next Add Participant Page select Treatment Provider for the Role and choose the Vendor option for the Party Type field. Complete any other relevant fields
 - Select Find Party
2. In the next Provider/Vendor/Facility Search page displayed enter either the ACC Identifier or Vendor/Facility Name then select Search.
3. You will then be shown a list of Vendors - select the appropriate Vendor and select OK.
4. In the next ACC External Vendor Search screen select OK.

5 You will then be routed back to the NGCM – Request for Clinical Records Eform where the Vendor code and name will now be shown.

1. Complete the remaining Eform fields:
 - If your request is Urgent click the box to the right of the Urgent? field and enter your rationale in the Reason why urgent field
 - The All document types field defaults to "Yes". If you don't require all documents change the drop down to No and enter document details in the Specific documents field.
 - If there are any additional questions for the Vendor, or comments for the Recovery Administrator enter these into the Any other questions or comments field
2. Select Next
3. Select Close

NOTES:

- A NGCM – Requested Information task is automatically generated and routed to the Recovery Administration task queue. The task Description will show the Vendor name to allow for easier follow up for Recovery Administration.
- The request will also show in the Recovery Plan Sub-case > Information Requested tab.

Summary

Objective

Client medical or clinical records help in a range of situations. They:

- help inform cover and support decisions
- provide further information about the injury, client and diagnosis
- help develop the rehabilitation plan
- help identify and manage any risks.

We can ask providers, including general practitioners (GPs) and District Health Boards (DHBs) to provide us with these medical or clinical records. See Requesting clinical records from DHBs. Policy

1.0 Rules

- a** When dealing with a client's medical or clinical records, we must take care to observe the requirements of the Privacy Act 2020 and the Health Information Privacy Code 2020. For more information, and the difference between personal and health information see ACC's privacy page.

A client must supply us with the information we need to make a decision about a claim unless they have a reasonable reason not to. See the Accident Compensation (AC) Act 2001, Section 72. Section 55 of the Act refers to the 'Responsibilities of the claimant to assist in establishment of cover and entitlements' and generally extends to responsibilities at the request of the Corporation. This means that ACC will, as part of its investigative role, request the relevant supporting information from the client, and their treating providers. Once investigations are complete, a decision can be made on the claim.

All medical or clinical records provided to ACC must be kept on the client's file.

2.0 When to request medical or clinical records

- a** When the client requests cover, additional diagnosis, support, or treatment from ACC, the onus/responsibility rests with the client and/or their provider to supply supporting clinical or medical information to help us to make the decision. If the client and/or their provider has not supplied the supporting information, ACC will, as part of its investigative role, request the relevant supporting information from the client, and their treating providers. Once investigations are complete, a decision can be made on the claim.

On the other hand, if ACC is considering withdrawing support or treatment, revoking cover, or ceasing entitlements such as weekly compensation, then the onus/responsibility sits with ACC to request the supporting medical or clinical records

Before making a request, you must ensure that the information has not already been requested. You must also check that clients are registered patients at the medical practices where notes need to be requested from.

When a provider requests additional treatment or other support on behalf of their client they should include all medical or clinical records with their request, at no additional charge to ACC or the client.

- b** Overseas medical records may be required in ordered to determine cover on a claim. In these cases, it is ACC's position that ACC is responsible for the sourcing of the medical records from the overseas provider as well as paying the provider directly for those records. This responsibility doesn't extend to ACC sourcing and purchasing overseas medical records for the purpose of investigating entitlement and/or treatment.
- c** Sections 56 and 57 Accident Compensation Act 2001 (the act) state that ACC must investigate cover on a claim at its own expense. There is nothing in the act barring ACC from gathering medical records from overseas when the records are required to determine cover.
- d** Examples of when overseas medical records may be required to determine cover:
- A client who meets the definition of being ordinarily resident in New Zealand who suffers a personal injury whilst overseas and seeks cover for that injury when they return to New Zealand.
 - A medical specialist comment is required from an overseas-based specialist due to the level of expertise required (e.g. complex treatment injury claims where an opinion is sought from an overseas based medical specialist who is an expert in the relevant field).
 - A client has immigrated to New Zealand and it needs to be determined whether their personal injury sustained in New Zealand is a new injury or a reagravation of an injury that occurred overseas before the client emigrated.

3.0 Limits on what we can request

- a** You must have a reason for requesting medical or clinical records.

We're only allowed to request information relating to the claim, so the provider must review the record and edit out any unrelated information. You must therefore use the correct service code to allow them to do this if necessary and invoice us correctly.


4.0 Medical or clinical record request forms and letters

- a** You must use the correct form or letter to request medical or clinical records.
- b** To request clinical notes and medical reports from providers use the relevant form or letter:

-  MD09a Further info – consultation notes – vendor
-  MD09b Allied - Further info - Consultation Notes - Vendor

NOTE Please make sure you have specified where the provider/vendor should send the requested notes to (the correct return email or postal address).


- c** Work Injury Inquiry Team

-  MD10b Allied - Further info - Medical Questionnaire - Vendor

5.0 Non-DHB provider medical or clinical records - Prior approval

- a** If medical or clinical records are likely to take more than an hour to prepare, the provider must get prior approval from the case manager who raised the initial request.

6.0 Service codes and prices

- a See Codes and prices for non-DHB medical or clinical records.

7.0 Types of medical or clinical records

- a The type of medical or clinical record(s) required will depend on the reason for the request. Records can include:
 - copies of specialist reports, directed from one medical practitioner to another
 - investigation results
 - clinical notes
 - reports by medical consultants
 - hospital records, including admission and discharge summaries
 - counselling notes for sensitive claims
 - notes on surgical operations
 - pathology and laboratory tests
 - reports on special tests and diagnostic procedures including x-ray and scan results
 - physiotherapy notes.

8.0 Quality

- a The number of medical or clinical record pages received from a provider may not reflect the time spent reviewing and editing. If you have concerns about the quality or quantity of provider medical or clinical records or their invoices, discuss this with:
 - a medical advisor
 - your supplier manager
 - the provider.

9.0 District Health Board (DHB) medical or clinical records - Knowing your DHB


- a Knowing how the DHB you work with stores and processes their client medical or clinical records will help you with your requests. For example if a client is still in hospital, their medical record will be on their hospital ward, rather than with the hospital medical records department.

Avoid making duplicate requests. You must make sure the request is necessary and complete the forms thoroughly.

Request the medical or clinical records from the correct contact.

10.0 Level of urgency

If needed to...	then request the information within...
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • inform a cover decision • inform an entitlement decision • confirm the injury or details of the injury • identify any other entitlements the client may be receiving through the DHB 	5 days

11.0 Prior approval

- a If you're requesting more than 340 pages from the DHB, they will seek prior approval from the case owner. The case owner must then consider whether the volume of information is actually needed. If it is needed, either:
 - amend the request to be more specific, ie request a date range or a particular treatment event, or
 - give approval to proceed as originally requested, and adjust the purchase approval increasing the price accordingly.

12.0 Service codes and prices

- a
 - the payment rates that DHBs charge ACC for copies of medical or clinical records are standardised across the country
 - the DHBs know to claim payment for a range rather than a number of pages, eg 1-20 pages etc.

13.0 What we don't pay for

- a Missing mandatory information including:
 - documentation required as part of the Non Acute Rehabilitation Services Schedule (ACC74, ACC739, ACC9 and ACC740)
 - documentation that may be attached to support the ACC705 which could include Emergency Department/Discharge report, ACC45, Allied Health Needs Assessment
 - services provided in a fracture clinic under the Clinical Services contract.

A purchase order should not be loaded for a payment for these requests.

14.0 Types of medical or clinical records

- a The type of medical or clinical record requested will differ depending on the reason for the request. Also see Scenarios for requesting DHB clinical records.

Type of record requested on ACC2386 (Clinical Records Request – DHB)	Example
Operation notes	Note on surgical operations
Clinical letters or notes	The medical or clinical records that describe all assessment and treatment by the team or specialist that have managed the client's injury either while an inpatient and/or outpatient – should be requested using the DHBC code. If you need a specialist's opinion on a specific question use the DHBR1 code and an MD02c letter
Radiology reports	X-ray, MRI, CT scan reports. Do not request hard copies of x-rays and MRIs. Radiology reports may be included in an Assessment Report Treatment Plan (ARTP)
Discharge summary	Summary of treatment received and ongoing plan when the client is discharged from hospital
Other, eg physiotherapist, OT	Reports/records/assessments from the physiotherapist, occupational therapist, speech therapist, social worker, who saw the client while they were in hospital. If you require an answer to a specific question, request this using the DHBR2 code and MD02c letter

15.0 Exceptions

- a • The Elective Surgery, Treatment Injury and National Serious Injury Service units may have specific requirements when:
 - making a request for a medical or clinical record
 - determining cover or support
 - managing the rehabilitation or risks
- What is requested is generally directed and reviewed by a Clinical Panel
- Treatment injury or elective surgery may request the client's full DHB record including nursing notes.
- b When requiring mental health records, there are specific timeframes and requirements:

To ensure ACC only collects information relevant and necessary for decision making, we need to communicate with our clients to determine a timeline for which to collect mental health records.

This aids in establishing a timeline with the client of their engagement with mental health services, organizations and Primary Health Care services.

16.0 Quality


- a The number of pages received from a DHB may not reflect the time spent reviewing and editing. If you have concerns about the quality or quantity of medical or clinical records or their invoices, discuss this with your team manager.

17.0 Completing the ACC2386 Clinical Records Request – DHB

- a All components for Section 1 (vendor details), Section 2 and 4 (patient details) and Section 6 (ACC staff member details) must be completed.

Section 3 (request details) is the most important section to complete accurately and may take the longest.

- Injury – review the claim Injury and Medical tab in Eos to assist you in identifying or confirming the injury
- Dates you require the records – you may have many options for confirming the dates the client was in hospital for example, ACC74, ACC9, ACC705 or check with the client directly.

Summary of the Health Information Privacy Code Policy v12.0



Summary

Objective

The Health Information Privacy Code 2020 (the Code) applies specific rules to organisations acting as health agencies to ensure that individual privacy is protected. The Code contains 13 Health Information Privacy Rules and works in conjunction with the Privacy Act 2020. It recognises that health information is special and needs to be treated differently as it:

- is considered confidential
- can be sensitive
- may have ongoing use.

With regard to the collection, use, storage and disclosure of health information the 13 Health Information Privacy Rules take the place of the 13 Information Privacy Principles of the Privacy Act 2020 and describe how the code is put into practice.

As of 1 December 2020, the new Privacy Act will come into effect. Please contact us if this page has not been updated by December 2020.

1.0 Rules

- a** You must handle health information in particular ways.

You must make sure you know, understand and comply with the health information privacy rules as there may be financial or other consequences for breaching them.

Complaints regarding breaches of these rules can be made to the Office of the Privacy Commissioner and, if necessary, to the Human Rights Review Tribunal.

2.0 The 13 Health Information Privacy Rules in brief

- a**
1. Only collect health information if you really need it
 2. Get it straight from the people concerned
 3. Tell them what you're going to do with it
 4. Be considerate when you're collecting it
 5. Take care of it once you've got it
 6. People can see their health information if they want to
 7. They can correct it if it's wrong
 8. Make sure health information is correct, up-to-date, complete, relevant, and not misleading, before you use it
 9. Get rid of it when you're done with it
 10. Use it for the purpose you got it
 11. Only disclose it if you have a good reason
 12. Only disclose it overseas if the recipient is subject to NZ's privacy law or a comparable overseas law.
 13. Only assign unique identifiers where permitted.

Knowledge about different types of information requests and how to handle them.

Background

The Privacy Act 2020 contains 13 Information Privacy Principles for collecting, accessing and releasing personal information. The Health Information Privacy Code 2020 contains 13 Health Information Privacy Rules for collecting, accessing and releasing an individual's health information.

We must all understand these principles and rules when handling requests for the release of personal and health information. For more information see 'Differences between personal and health information'.

Policy

1.0 Who can request personal information?

- a Under the Privacy Act 2020, only the client, their representative, or a person with authority to act on their behalf may request information that we hold about that individual.

If the request for personal information is from...	then treat it as a request under the ...
the individual concerned or their authorised representative	Privacy Act 1993
another individual	Official Information Act 1982
an organisation or government agency

NOTE Definitions

Under the Privacy Act, the individual is someone requesting information for themselves. An individual's representative is defined in the Health Information Privacy Code 2020 as their parent/guardian if they are under 16, OR the executor/administrator of their estate if they are deceased.

- b Under the Official Information Act 1982 (OIA) the following parties may request information that we hold about a client:
 - a third party administrator
 - an insurance company assessing a related claim
 - any other person or organisation.

This does not necessarily mean we can release all the information requested. Please see the Official Information Requests Policy for assistance.

PROCESS Official Information Requests Policy

2.0 Response time

- a Under the Privacy Act, we must make a decision on a request for personal information:

- as soon as reasonably practicable
- within a maximum of 20 working days after receiving the request.

INP01 - Acknowledge Personal Info Request; INPIS02 - All About Requesting Personal Information

NOTE Extension of response time

Sometimes you may need a time extension to respond to a request for personal information. Extensions are allowed where:

- large quantities of information are involved
- searching through large quantities of information will unreasonably interfere with ACC's operations
- you need to consult with other business units.

You may only make one request for an extension so you must be able to complete the response within the extended timeframe.


You must formally notify the requestor about an extension of time within the 20-working day limit and include the:

- extension period required
- reason(s) for the extension
- advice that the requestor has the right to lodge a complaint about the extension with the Office of the Privacy Commissioner.

NOTE Late decisions on personal information requests

If we have missed the 20 working day timeframe for responding to personal information requests, this will need to be reported in the Privacy Reporting Tool as a privacy breach.

3.0 Transferring a personal information request

- a** If we don't hold the requested personal information, but know another agency that does, we can transfer the request to the other agency under the Privacy Act 2020, Section 43. The transfer must be arranged within 10 working days from the date of receiving the request.

- b** You will also need to notify the requestor that you are transferring their information request.

4.0 Releasing personal information

- a** We must release requested personal information unless we have good reasons to withhold it. See 'When to withhold personal information'

5.0 Releasing only part of the requested personal information

- a** Sometimes it's appropriate to release only part of the personal information requested. The Privacy Act, Section 43 permits us to redact the part(s) of the document containing this information before releasing it. We must provide reasons for withholding any parts of the information.

We must use the Adobe Pro redaction function to redact the information so that the recipient cannot read any of the information that has been redacted.

NOTE Example

- When information identifies multiple individuals it may be appropriate to delete information about other people from the document before we release it
- When a client's medical practitioner advises that disclosing particular information would be likely to affect the client's physical or mental health.

6.0 Requests for Access Logs/Footprint Reports

- a** Access logs, also known as footprint reports, are spreadsheets ACC is able to generate to show each time a member of staff has accessed a client's claim file or party record in Eos. The access log contains limited information, showing only the time and date of access to an Eos claim (or party record), the name of the staff member who accessed it, their user ID, 'job title' and 'department' (as recorded in Eos) at the time the report was run.

This report contains personal information about our clients and is readily retrievable by ACC, so people have a right to request this information from us under the Privacy Act.

If you receive a request for an access log or footprint report, refer to Request for Access Log/Footprint Report.

 **PROCESS** Complete Digital Footprint Request**7.0 Charging for information**

- a ACC cannot charge for providing personal information. Private agencies may choose to charge for personal information requests but public service agencies cannot.

8.0 Requests from members of Parliament

- a We frequently receive enquiries from members of Parliament (MPs), or their electorate office staff, advising that they're acting on behalf of an ACC client or customers.

If you're concerned about disclosing or releasing the information, contact the client to confirm the MP is acting on their behalf. If you're unsure of how to proceed, contact Government Services for advice.

9.0 Requests from members of the New Zealand Police

- a We occasionally receive requests from the Police for information about clients. These should be referred to the Privacy Team who will provide advice on whether it is appropriate to release the information requested.


If you receive a written request, please email it to the Privacy Team on privacy.officer@acc.co.nz.

If you receive a verbal request, advise the Police that they must make their request in writing and send it to privacy.officer@acc.co.nz.

Under no circumstances should you disclose any information about the client before consulting with the Privacy Team.

10.0 Requests from insurance companies for client information

- a If you receive a request from an insurance company for a copy of a client's file(s), see 'Manage requests for client information' from insurers' policy and 'Respond to a private insurer request for client information' process.

- a The Office of the Privacy Commissioner is responsible for investigating complaints about the withholding or disclosure of personal information. Our Privacy team manages ACC's liaison with the Office of the Privacy Commissioner.

Obtain Verbal or Written Authority

Guidelines



Introduction and purpose

We must ensure that our clients understand what it means to provide us with their authority to collect medical and other records. While the ACC45 claim lodgement form provides us with this authority, playing the verbal recording when we onboard the client, ensures they fully understand how and why we collect their records, and that they agree to it.

Things to note:

- It is permissible to rely on the ACC45 plus the verbal authority for up to 12 months if the claim is straightforward and you are collecting only a limited amount of information. After 12 months, if further information is required, an ACC6300 will be needed
- In some cases, a verbal authority is not appropriate and an ACC6300 will be required
- In some cases, even if you have an ACC45 and a verbal authority, you may need to progress to an ACC6300. This is usually when the claim becomes more complicated than it originally was.

When Verbal Authority is Not Appropriate

For some clients, playing the verbal recording isn't the best option to obtain their authority. The following examples will support you to determine when obtaining written authority is more appropriate. These are only a handful of examples; please use your judgement to determine the best option for your client. If in doubt, speak with your Privacy Advisor.

If the client...	then...
has sensitive claim information	obtain authority with an ACC6300 form. Verbal authority must not be used.
is under the age of 16 years	obtain authority with an ACC6300 form. Verbal authority must not be used.
has a treatment injury and the following apply: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • we need to request significant amounts of information • we will need to obtain external clinical advice and to do this we will send medical information to the clinician 	obtain authority with an ACC6300 form. Verbal authority must not be used.
has communication or comprehension obstacles: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • limited understanding of English • any disability limiting the client's comprehension or communication (for example, hearing loss, moderate-severe head injury) 	obtain authority with an ACC6300 form or in MyACC. Verbal authority must not be used.

If the client...**then...**

has any of the following:

- advocacy involvement
- active review cases
- active care indicators
- anything to identify trust issues with ACC in the past

obtain authority with an ACC6300 form or MyACC. Verbal authority must not be used.

Progressing from Verbal Authority to an ACC6300

You should be constantly evaluating whether an ACC6300 is required during the first 12 months. For example, if the client now requires a mental injury assessment and we need to collect pre-injury mental health notes, you are required to obtain an ACC6300. The following examples will support you in your decision making. Again, judgement is required. If in doubt, speak with your Privacy Advisor.

If the client...**then...**

has an active claim which has been open for more than 12 months and you still need to collect some information

obtain an ACC6300 form or in MyACC

has a claim that now requires the need for pre or post-injury medical notes about mental health or other medical conditions that may be impacting on the covered injuries – especially if the information is needed for the following:

- Mental injury assessment
- Neuropsychological assessment
- Requested by a medical advisor, psychologist or psychiatrist, internal or external

obtain an ACC6300 form or in MyACC

has a claim that now requires the collection of information that may be delicate in nature, e.g. gynaecological or fertility related

obtain an ACC6300 form or in MyACC.

has a treatment injury and we now need to obtain external clinical advice and to do this we will send medical information to the clinician

obtain an ACC6300 form or in MyACC.

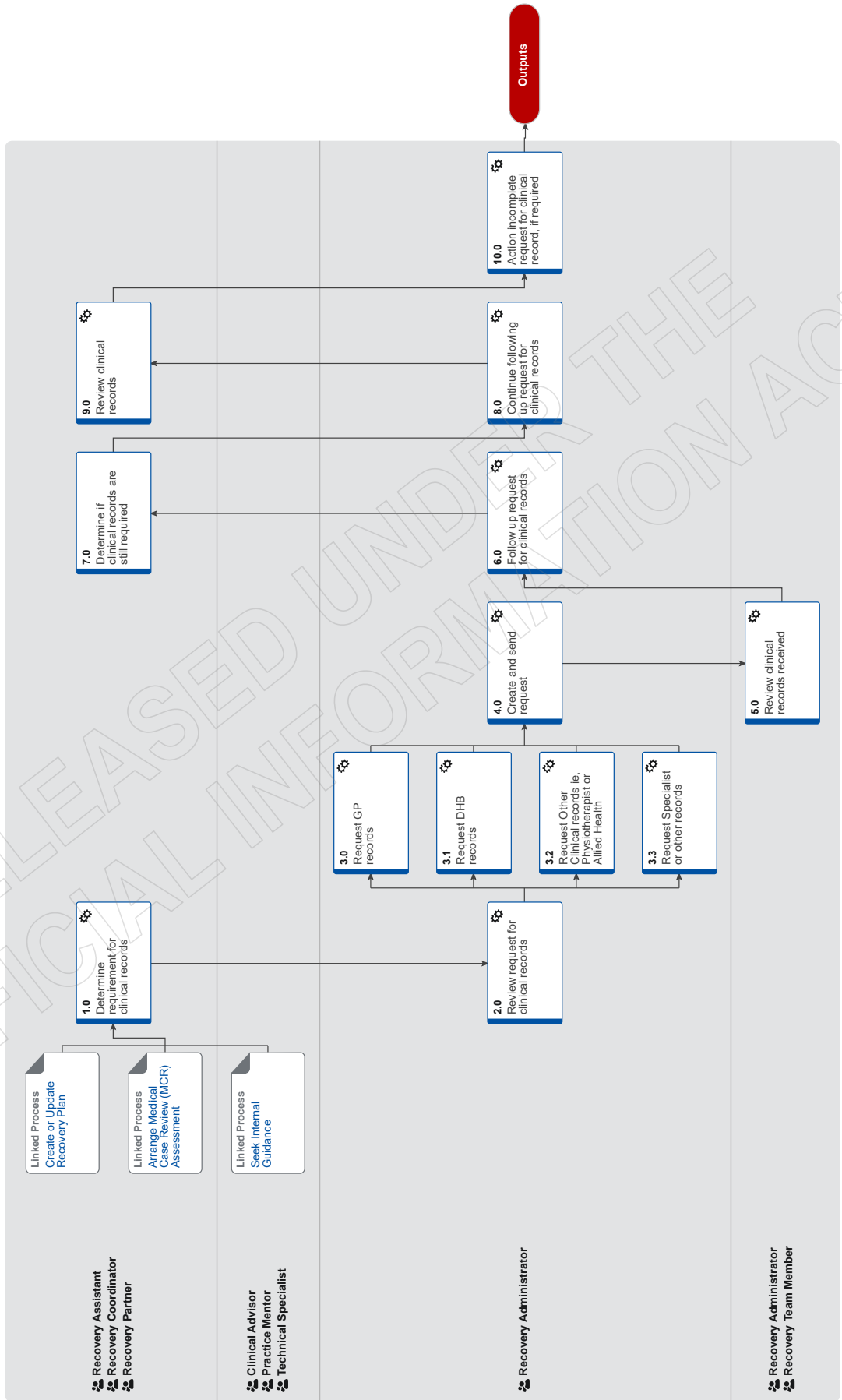
Providers

Some providers may be reluctant to disclose information unless they see a written authority.

Summary

Objective

To request medical or clinical records from a client's vendor, so that we have enough information to make a cover, support or treatment decision.

Background

ACC must request medical or clinical records from a client's vendor if we don't already have enough information to make a cover, support or treatment decision. ACC can ask external vendors, including General Practitioners (GPs), District Health Boards (DHBs) and specific treatment vendors (such as physiotherapists or chiropractors) to provide ACC with medical or clinical records related to the case.

Client medical or clinical records help in a range of situations. They:

- help inform cover, support or treatment decisions
- provide further information about the injury, client and diagnosis
- help develop the rehabilitation plan
- help identify and manage any risks.

Each time we request information about a client or a claim, the client should be aware of the request and why we need the information.

Only submit a request for these records if it has been more than 5 working days and they have not been received. A Purchase Order is not required for these requests.

NOTE What are the timeframes for receiving information?

If you are requesting information from a DHB, the timeframe is:

- non-urgent request – 21 working days
- urgent request – 6 working days

If you are requesting information from a non-DHB (GP, Medical Centre), the timeframe is:

- non-urgent request – 11 working days
- urgent request – 6 working days

- C** In Eos, in the Consent tab of the Recovery Plan, check if the client has provided authority to collect medical and other records from third parties or has an ATA in place.

NOTE What if there is no authority on the client's claim, or the authority has expired?

NOTE What if you need notes older than 2 years or more? or if there are multiple claims for the client?

To ensure ACC only collects information relevant and necessary for decision making, we need to communicate with our clients to determine a timeline for which to collect medical records.

To help guide your conversation with the client to establish a timeline of their engagement with mental health services, organisations and Primary Health Care services, please consider asking the client the following questions:

- Have you spoken to your Doctor about any concerns with being unable to sleep, stress or anxiety?
- Have you spoken with any health care professionals such as Doctors or organisations about the assault and support?
- When did you first engage with these health care professionals or organisations? DD/MM/YYYY or a rough estimate eg June 2018 is sufficient
- Confirm the client is happy for ACC to collect these clinical records from the date of DD/MM/YYYY to assist in ACC making a cover decision and support decisions on ongoing entitlements and support?

If, following your conversation with the client, you're unable to determine a specific period to request clinical records, then up to 2 years of Clinical Records can be requested as a reasonable timeframe.

If there is a clear reason that 2 years is likely to be insufficient, we can collect up to 5 years if rationale exists that we are reasonably likely to need this. ACC will then be able to determine, once the information is received, whether we have sufficient information for the purpose we requested it. In all instances, it is essential to consult and confirm what information ACC intends to collect, with the client.

At least one claim must have a signed Authority to Collect information (ACC6300) within the current year. Discuss with the client if you need to request information not already on file. Document their verbal authority.

NOTE What if you are requesting Mental Health notes?

Before requesting Mental Health notes a signed ACC6300 Authority to collect information must be on the file. (Received within the last 12 months)

NOTE What if you need notes where a client has an active claim, but you require notes for other claims for the same client that are inactive?

Check the other claims for information before proceeding to request information.

Request for notes on Multiple claims, but to one provider, Task on active claim noting all claim numbers

Request for notes on previous claims:

The task should be created on the active claim (if no active claim, task on the claim you need) in the task, note which claim number you need clinical notes for and add the vendor as a participant on claim

- d** Check that the client has been seen by the Vendor you are requesting records from for this injury/claim.

NOTE What if the Provider is under contract?

To check to see if a Provider is under contract, search via MFP, if under contract a purchase order is not required. When completing the e-form, in the 'Purchase Order Number required' drop down box, select 'No'.

NOTE What if the client has been seen by (including but not limited to) a Specialist or Surgeon at a Private Hospital?

Contact the Specialists rooms to confirm where this request should be sent. Eg. Private Hospital or Specialists rooms. Add the specialist name to the request for information.

NOTE What if the claim is for a client with a Mental Injury?

If you are requesting mental health records from any of the following providers, you must contact them first to confirm they hold the records and confirm the email address to send the information request:

Using the appropriate Eos template, email the vendor and attach the original clinical request and advise the vendor of the missing information as outlined by the Recovery Team Member in the task, and then close the task.

An email example could be:

"Thank you for sending the requested medical information on (insert date). We have reviewed the medical notes and noticed some information is missing. Could you please send a copy of (insert what information is missing here) to us at your earliest convenience. Thank you"

This will then create the NGCM - Follow up Request for Clinical Records task.

- d** In Eos, close NGCM - Incomplete Information Request task. This will then create the 'NGCM - Follow up Request for Clinical Records' task.

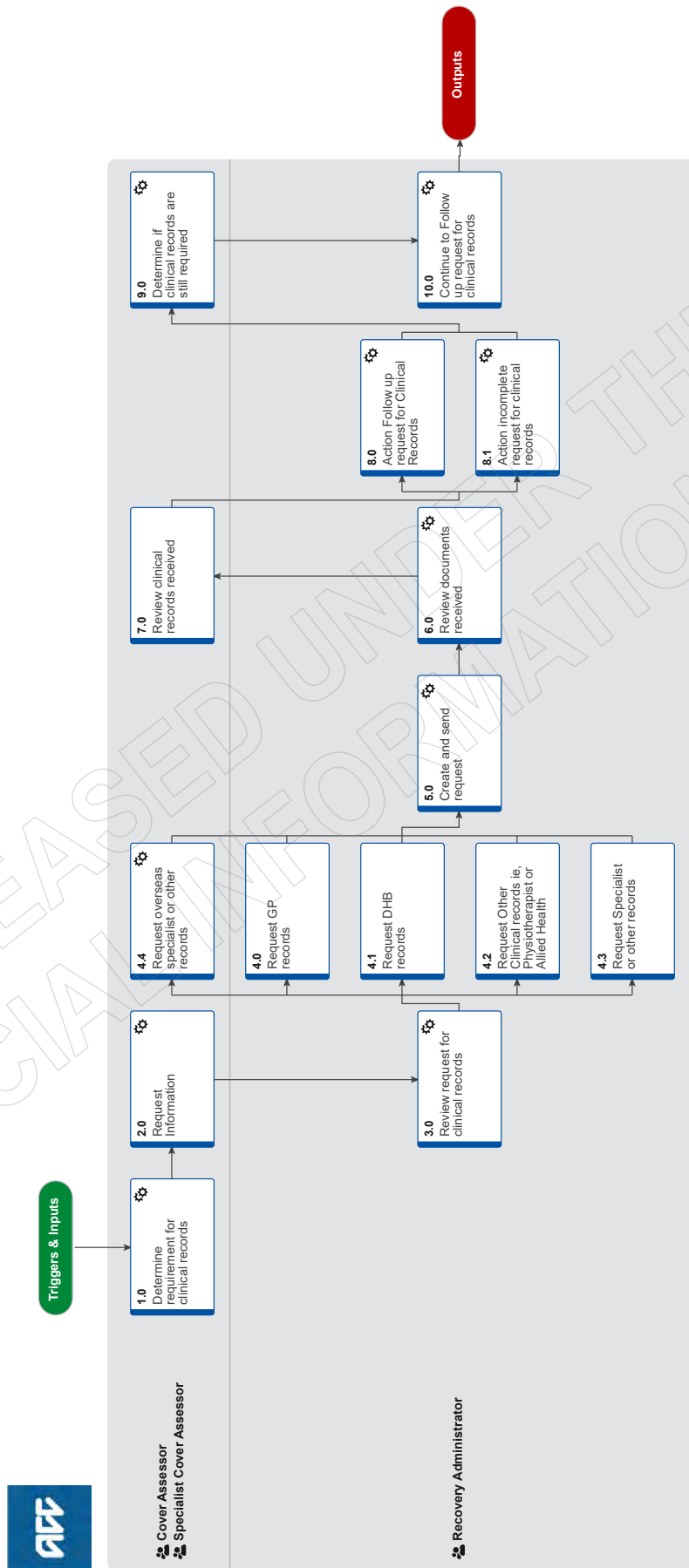

Summary

Objective

To request medical or clinical records from DHBs, GPs and specialists for Treatment Injury Claims.

Background

ACC must request medical or clinical records from a client's vendor if we don't already have enough information to make a cover, support or treatment decision. ACC can ask external vendors, including General Practitioners (GPs), District Health Boards (DHBs) and specific treatment vendors (such as physiotherapists or chiropractors) to provide ACC with medical or clinical records related to the claim.

Client medical or clinical records help in a range of situations. They:

- help inform cover, support or treatment decisions
- provide further information about the injury, client and diagnosis
- help develop the rehabilitation plan
- help identify and manage any risks.

Each time we request information about a client or a claim, the client should be aware of the request and why we need the information.

Procedure

1.0 Determine requirement for clinical records

Cover Assessor, Specialist Cover Assessor

- Check the claim for information already on the claim, before proceeding.
- Determine what type of medical or clinical records you need to obtain by referring to the links below.

- Request medical or clinical records Policy
- Summary of the Health Information Privacy Code Policy

NOTE What if you need to obtain Specialist records or High Tech imaging?

Specialist notes or High Tech Imaging contracts require them to send through their reports within 5 working days of the patient consultation. Only submit a request for these records if it has been more than 5 working days and they have not been received. A Purchase Order is not required for these requests.

NOTE What are the timeframes for receiving information?

If you are requesting information from a DHB, the timeframe is:

- non-urgent request – 15 working days
- urgent request – 5 working days

If you are requesting information from a non-DHB (GP, Medical Centre), the timeframe is:

- non-urgent request – 10 working days
- urgent request – 5 working days

- In Eos, check the claim for a signed ACC6300 consent form or that the client has provided authority to collect medical and other records from third parties.

NOTE What if there is no authority on the client's claim, or the authority has expired?

Refer to the NG GUIDELINES Obtain Verbal or Written Authority for guidance.

If an ACC6300 is needed, go to the Obtain Client Authority to Collect Information process.

- PROCESS** Obtain Client Authority to Collect Information

- ACC Guidelines to obtain verbal or written authority

NOTE What if you need notes older than 5 years and there are multiple claims for the client?

At least one claim must have a signed Authority to Collect information (ACC6300) within the current year. Discuss with the client if you need to request information not already on file. Document their verbal authority.

NOTE What if you are requesting Mental Health notes?

Before requesting Mental Health notes a signed ACC6300 Authority to collect information must be on the file. Once the ACC6300 has been received, send copy to the provider when requesting notes.

NOTE What if you need notes where a client has an active claim, but you require notes for other claims for the same client that are inactive?

Check the other claims for information before proceeding to request information.

Request for notes on Multiple claims, but to one provider, Task on active claim noting all claim numbers

Request for notes on previous claims:

The task should be created on the active claim (if no active claim, task on the claim you need) in the task, note which claim number you need clinical notes for and add the vendor as a participant on claim

- d** In Eos, check the client has been seen by the Provider you are requesting records from for the treatment injury claim.

NOTE What if the Provider is under contract?

To check to see if a Provider is under contract, search via MFP, if under contract a purchase order is not required. When completing the e-form, in the 'Purchase Order Number required' drop down box, select 'No'.

NOTE What if the client has been seen by (including but not limited to) a Specialist or Surgeon at a Private Hospital?

Contact the Specialists rooms to confirm where this request should be sent. Eg. Private Hospital or Specialists rooms. Add the specialist name to the request for information.

- e** In Eos, check the correct Vendor is entered as a participant on the claim.

NOTE What if the Vendor hasn't been added as a participant?

Add the Vendor as a participant to the claim

 Manage Participants

NOTE What if the provider has not been set up as a Vendor?

In MFP, confirm the provider is not a Vendor. In the task to Recovery Administration, note the use of Vendor ACC Default J99966.

NOTE What if the request for clinical notes is from a DHB?

Refer to 'Contacts for requesting District Health Board clinical records' to locate who to request the information from and add the DHB as a participant using the correct vendor code.

2.0 Request Information**Cover Assessor, Specialist Cover Assessor**

- a** In Eos, at Recovery Plan sub-case level, Add Activity and choose NGCM - Information Requests.

- b** In the task description, specify the request if for a Treatment Injury claim, then complete as per the 'Requesting Clinical Records' system steps.

 Requesting Clinical Records

 Request clinical records/report for Held Treatment Injury

NOTE What information do you need to include in the information request task?

- Refer to the 'Referring Tasks to Recovery Administration - Principles'.
- The 'basis of the claim' MUST be specified in the task.
- Add 'Treatment Injury' to the task description to allow recovery admin to easily identify your request is for treatment injury.
- If requesting notes on more than one claim, record all claims numbers you are requesting notes from.
- If requesting notes from a GP, please include the name of the GP and the name of the practice.

 Referring Tasks to Recovery Administration - Principles

NOTE What if the information request relates to notes needed to make a cover decision?

Edit the task and change the priority to 'High'.

NOTE What if the Vendor is not a lodging provider?

In the NGCM - Information Request, note that the client's ACC6300 needs to be sent with the request. Edit the 'Confirm Cover Decision' task and add the details to record the request for information.

NOTE What if you are requesting medical notes for multiple claims from the same vendor?

Note the following in the task:

- Specific "from" and "to" dates.
- If you are requesting additional notes for a claim from the same vendor, to avoid duplication check the from and to dates on the previous request.

For example: 1st request for medical information "from" date is 21/06/2019 to 21/08/2019 (Present date in which the purchase order was created). Next request will go "from" 21/08/2019 "to" 21/10/2019.

NOTE What if the request is for hard materials?

Clearly state in the task description "Hard materials [type of material] required from [provider] to be sent to [your address]".

3.0 Review request for clinical records

Recovery Administrator

- a** Upon allocation of the 'NGCM - Requested Information' task in Salesforce, open the associated task in Eos and select [Do Task] from your task queue.

- b** Review the task to check the name of the Provider has been provided.

NOTE **What if the name of the Vendor hasn't been provided in the task or not added as a Participant on the claim?**
The Vendor details should be included in the task. If the details are missing, contact the requestor for the information and ask them to add as a Participant on the claim.

NOTE **What if the vendor is noted as Vendor ACC Default J99966?**
Some records may be requested from Vendors who are not set up as an ACC Provider. In this case, the Vendor Default of J99966 is used.

NOTE **What if the request is for medical notes for multiple claims?**
When requesting notes on Multiple claims, but to one provider, the Purchase Order is created on the active claim; all claims numbers should be listed in the letter.

Request for notes on previous claims:

When requesting notes on a previous claim, the task should be received on an active claim which notes the claim number the notes are needed for. Purchase Order and request letter should be completed on the previous claim number. Close the request task- this will create a follow up task, edit this follow up task with the previous claim number the Purchase Order was created on.

- c** Check the task to determine if you need to generate a Purchase Order.

NOTE **What if the task identifies that a Purchase Order is not required?**
Go to 'Documents' tab and select 'Add', generate the T111 Clinical Information request - Vendor letter. When editing the T111, ensure that you remove anything regarding a purchase order or invoicing. Refer to the T111 Admin Guidance Template for specific instructions on how to edit the letter and what sections need to be removed. Finally, go to Activity 5.0 Create and send request.

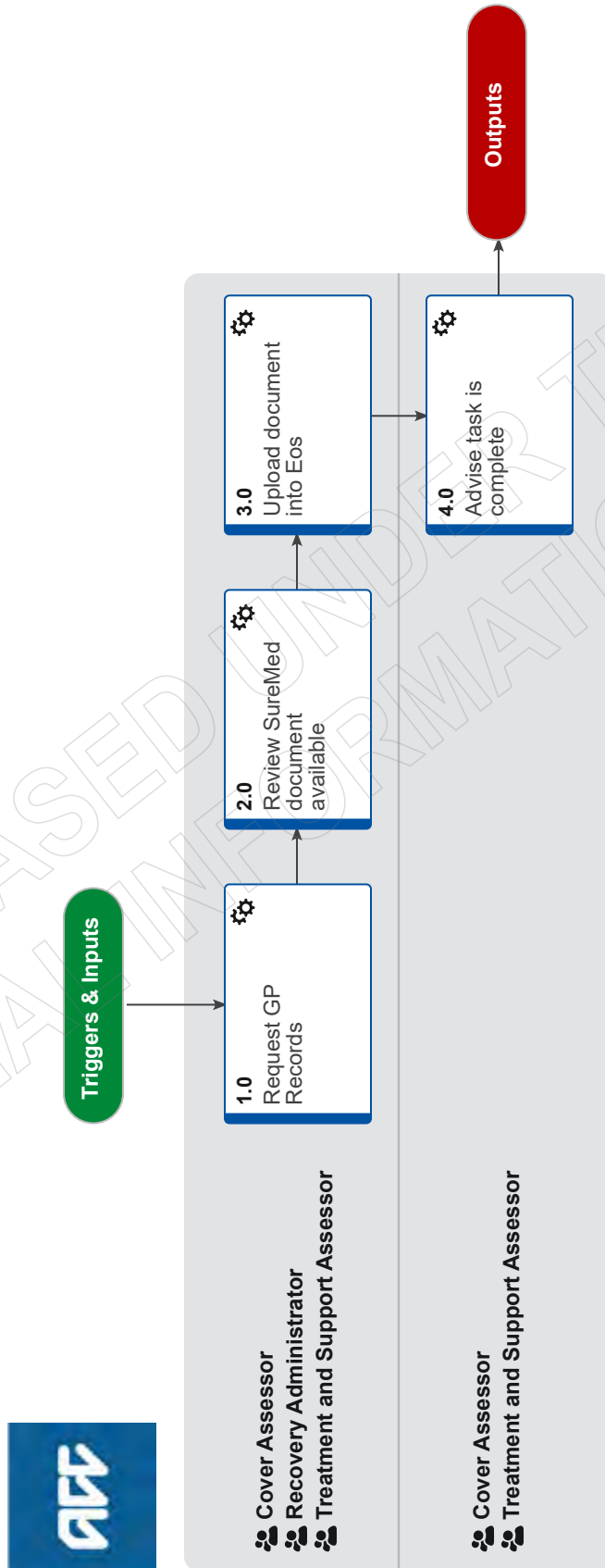

1.0 Request GP Records

Cover Assessor, Recovery Administrator, Treatment and Support Assessor

a Open the SureMed portal and enter all information to complete the request.

NOTE What if the SureMed portal does not open?

Ring the SureMed help line 0800 500 959, do not call IT Helpdesk.

NOTE How do you know which Information Request to select within SureMed?

Ensure you check what information you require before making a request. The 'Specific Piece of Information for a Claim (up to three pieces of information)' request is the most cost-effective for ACC and simplest for GPs, please ensure you select this request type if you only need specific claim information.

Specific Piece of Information for a Claim (Up to three pieces of information) = lodgement notes for establishing cover. You may specify up to three specific pieces of information for a single claim/injury e.g. A GP consultation note, MRI scan result, radiology report

Single body part / injury Request = medical notes to support incapacity and ongoing entitlements. Used to obtain detailed information on a single body part only (or condition when considering mental injury or treatment injury).

Specialised claims or multiple claims/injuries = Specialised claims, eg sensitive claims, mental injury, work related gradual process, treatment injury. Entitlements that need to be assessed against more than one claim, eg surgical intervention where the client has multiple claims related to requested surgical site. Used to obtain detailed information on up to three body parts (or conditions when considering mental injury or treatment injury).


NOTE Ensure you enter the Doctors name on the demographics page of the request and include reference to the ACC45 numbers for all claims referred to in the request. If you have not been provided a Doctors name in your task, go back to the Recovery Team Member, it is their responsibility to provider a GP name.

NOTE "Claims Product" box must be ticked when creating a request or the system will not allow you to proceed.

NOTE What if the doctor to request clinical notes from is not on the list?

Ring the SureMed help line 0800 500 959 and advise them. They will follow up with the clinic and have the GP added to the list. If SureMed advises you can use another GP on the list, you can do this, but make sure you add a note for KonnectNet advising the name of the correct GP as per your EOS task.

Alternatively, follow the process "Request Clinical Records" activity 3.0 Request GP records to manually request the clinical records.

 **PROCESS** Request Clinical Records

NOTE What if there is a duplicate flag on SureMed?

Follow the duplicate flag process and check if the request is a duplicate before continuing.

b Attach the SureMed consent form to each request.

NOTE When should you use an ACC6300?

If the request is for a Sensitive Claim or there is an ACC6300 already in EOS then attach this instead of the SureMed Consent form (above)

c In Eos, close the Requested Information task. This will automatically generate a Follow up Requested Information task for Recovery Administration. In the Follow Up Requested Information Eos task, note that clinical records have been requested via SureMed and include the reference number from the SureMed portal.

NOTE Use the Follow Up Requested Information task for this

With SureMed requests, Admin will no longer need to follow up with the provider as KonnectNet will do this on our behalf. The follow up tasks will remain open in EOS in the Recovery Administration EOS Department Queue. Follow Up tasks are to remain in the department queue at all times.

Should you be allocated one via Salesforce, you can log into SureMed and using the reference number provided in the follow up task, check the "Tasks & Notes" tab to confirm the status of the request and re-set the follow up task target date to one day after SureMed are due to follow up. If detailed notes have been made explaining why there are delays etc. it is useful to copy this into the follow up task so Recovery Team Members can see why there are delays with the notes being received back.

Follow up tasks are to remain open until medical notes have been uploaded to EOS by Inbound Document Management Administrators (IDM).

NOTE What should you know about the tasks & notes within SureMed?

- Tasks and Notes will display every interaction and update that SureMed have had from the medical practice. SureMed should follow up with the practice every five working days and leave a message.
- Check tasks and notes by selecting + symbol on the left hand side of the request or by clicking on the clients name and then selecting the tasks & Notes tab.
- This tab will inform you on reasons for delays or anything else going on with the request.
- SureMed will also send you a task if you have requested from the incorrect practice or if there are any other issues that need to be actioned or acknowledged (it is the responsibility of the initial requestor to action these tasks). — This will appear as an email notification but can also be viewed through the 'Manage' drop down box and then 'Tasks'.
- Once actioned or acknowledged, select complete task and it will disappear.
- Also use this section when creating tasks for SureMed in regards to urgent requests etc.

NOTE How to clone a request

If you have been notified by KonnectNet that there is information that needs changing (e.g client name spelt differently, incorrect GP etc).

1. Search for the client using the SureMed reference number.
2. Click on the ACTIONS button on the far right hand side of the screen. A drop down menu will appear
3. Select Clone
4. Make the required changes on the Demographics tab. All information entered from your original request will have copied over to the clone request, you do not need to re-enter what is being requested or re-upload the consent form.
5. Once corrections have been made, submit the request as usual and make sure to note the new reference number in the EOS Follow up task.

NOTE What if you receive a task notification advising the client is not registered at that medical practice?

If you receive a task notification from KonnectNet that has advised the client is not registered at the medical practice, make a note of this and any information provided on the NGCM – Information Not Received task which generates once you close the NGCM – Follow up Requested Information task. If your task is for a Treatment Injury claim you will not be able to add a note to the NGCM - Information Not Received task, in this instance you should contact the Specialist Cover Assessor or the task creator of the initial Requested Information task.

NOTE What if the notes have been received on SureMed, but they have not been uploaded to EOS?

Admin are to push the follow up task out to allow time for Inbound Document Management Administrators (IDM) to upload the notes.

Push the follow up task out for 3 days as IDM usually have a 48 hour turn around for uploading medical notes. If the notes still haven't been uploaded after 3 days, contact the IDM team member who accessed the medical notes on the SureMed Portal to follow up. If we do not upload the notes within 14 days of them being accessed, SureMed's Data Retention Policy will delete the notes and we will have to request the information again.

NOTE Do not close the follow up task if the medical notes have not been received.

Follow up tasks are to remain open until medical notes have been uploaded to EOS by Inbound Document Management Administrators (IDM). The only exception to this is if the request is declined or cancelled.

2.0 Review SureMed document available

Cover Assessor, Recovery Administrator, Treatment and Support Assessor

- a Open the email from SureMed and click on the link to the document.
- b Review the document to ensure it contains information for the correct client (3 point check).

NOTE What if the Recovery Team Member advises the document needs redaction?

If information needs to be redacted, the request should come to Recovery Admin via email, with clear instructions on which information needs to be redacted.

If redactions are less than 5 pages, Admin can complete redactions as per usual process, but still enter an FYI "To Do" note in the KonnectNet portal advising them information had to be redacted.

If redactions are more than 5 pages, advise SureMed that the Medical Centre needs to redact the documents and only send the information that was requested.

- 1) Whilst navigating a current request, under the 'Tasks & Notes' section select 'Create a new Task/Note'.
- 2) On the box that appears select 'Task for Konnect NET' on the left box and 'Request' on the right box.
- 3) Write in the bottom box what you would like redacted. Eg "Please have the practice redact all information unrelated to the clients right shoulder" and click submit.
- 4) Create an Admin Request task stating the Medical Centre's name and the original SureMed reference number and note 'Awaiting Redaction'. Push task out for 5 days and reply to the redaction email advising we have notified KonnectNet and have created an Admin task to follow up on.

NOTE What if information is missing?

- 1) Create a task on SureMed informing what notes are missing. While in the request you are missing information for, navigate to the 'Tasks & Notes' tab -> 'Create a new Task/Note'.
- 2) In the left box select 'Insurer Requested MIR', the right box will autofill.
- 3) In the bottom box write clearly what information was missing that you still require. Eg "Missing notes from a consult dated 04/01/2014". When the missing notes are received, you will be notified as normal.

NOTE What if there isn't an email to review?

An alternative way of viewing your, or any team members documents is through the vault. Click on Reports -> Unread Vault Items. Once downloaded the notes will leave the 'Unread Vault Items'.

3.0 Upload document into Eos

Cover Assessor, Recovery Administrator, Treatment and Support Assessor

- a Save the document onto your Desktop.
- b In Eos, go to 'Documents' tab – click 'Add' button on the right side > 'Upload Document' > Document Type: IB-Medical Reports/Notes

Objectives of the CGF are to:

- Embed systematic clinical governance across all activity.
- Ensure that clients and whānau are safe, healthy, independent and participating to the greatest possible extent.
- Ensure that Health and Disability sector leaders, both internally and externally, collaborate to effectively improve client and whānau outcomes.
- Deliver clinical insight and champion a Quality System comprised of quality assurance / management and continuous quality improvement.
- Develop a workforce, internal and external to ACC, that is capable and delivers toward the goals of best client and whānau outcomes and experiences.
- Add value by guiding activity that drives performance and quality of services and care.

What is the ACC Clinical Governance Framework

People, culture, leadership, decision-making delegations and information are key elements in any organisational system. In ACC, these elements must work in unison to effectively deliver safe, high-quality care and continuously improved service commissioning to deliver customer-focused health and rehabilitation outcomes. A clinical governance framework can strategically guide our work, provide a consistent language and support an empowering clinical culture.

The CGF provides the foundation and structure for clinical activity in ACC. It outlines how ACCs clinical community can strategically pursue best clinical outcomes and experiences for ACC clients and whānau.

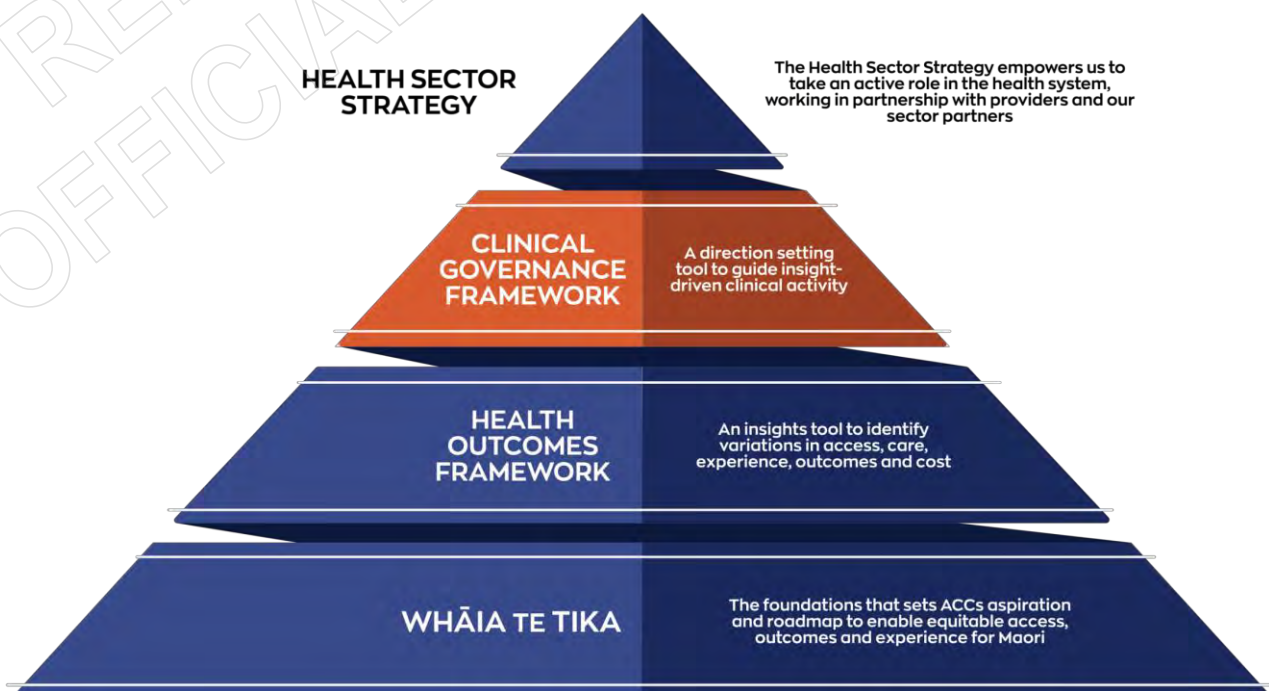
Why does ACC need a Clinical Governance Framework

ACC has legislated responsibility to deliver “...provision of entitlements that restores to the maximum practicable extent a claimant’s health, independence and participation” and “... a framework for the collection, co-ordination, and analysis of injury-related information” (AC Act 2001).

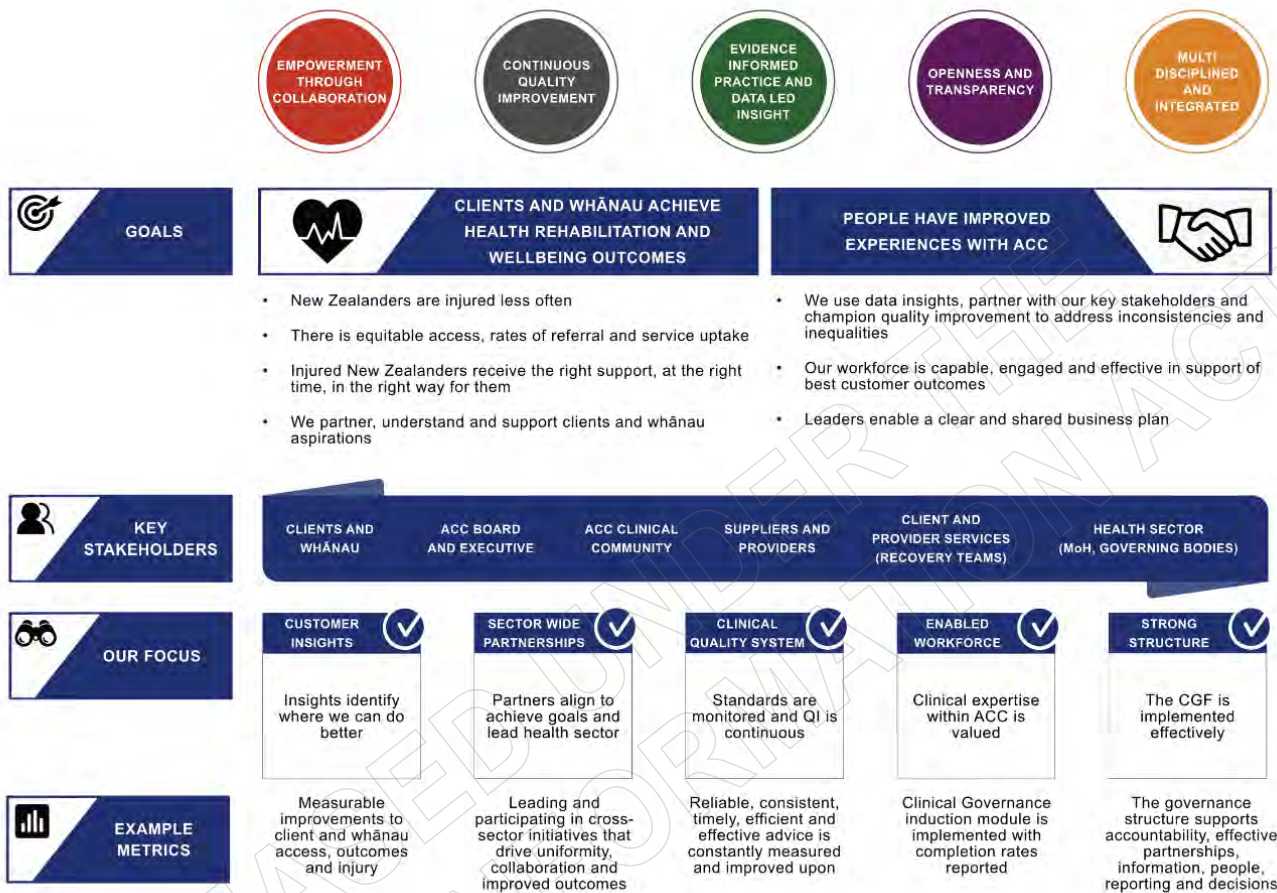
The CGF presents our approach to the clinical governance role we have in the delivery of ACC’s purpose in partnership with the health sector. As a healthcare commissioner and provider, we are accountable for high quality safe services that deliver intended outcomes.

ACC has well-established corporate and financial governance. There is opportunity to deliver comprehensive ACC governance with an increased focus on Treaty responsiveness and clinical governance. Incorporating the CGF into our existing governance structures ensures we have the appropriate levels of transparency, consistency, coordination and alignment across the organisation to drive the desired culture and outcomes.

The key principles or ‘How we Approach Our Work’

The principles underpin and support the CGF. They build on existing principles from our ACC behaviours, Whāia te Tika, the ACC Health Sector Strategy and the Provider Management Framework:

- **Empowerment through collaboration:** We partner with internal and external stakeholders. We share our knowledge and expertise. We are responsive to Te Tiriti ō Waitangi.
- **Continuous quality improvement:** We build on the good, fix issues, learn from failure and keep adapting to get better.
- **Evidence-informed best-practice and data-led insight:** We keep up to date with latest research. We develop tools that reflect best-practice. Our activities are informed by insights drawn from data and evidence.
- **Openness and transparency:** We build a culture of trust and feel safe to speak up. We value open communication and alignment.
- **Interdisciplinary and integrated:** We value diversity and work to our strengths. We work across clinical and non-clinical functions. We are stronger working together as a team.

Summary

Clinical governance enables high-quality, equitable and responsive services, delivered by a capable and effective workforce, to support ACC customers, clients and whānau to achieve their best health and wellbeing outcomes. The CGF is a direction-setting tool to guide insight-driven clinical activity that delivers customer outcomes for ACC. It represents an opportunity for ACC to champion greater Treaty and clinical responsiveness that helps deliver quality health outcomes for all New Zealanders. ACC clinical governance enables us to build and maintain structures that support excellence in the unique ACC context and empowers us to deliver safe, quality care.

Appendix 2: Clinical Quality System Tools

Quality Management and Quality Improvement work together with Clinical Governance to create ACC's Clinical Quality System.

Definitions

Clinical Governance is "The way we do things around here". Our foundation, structure and culture. Clinical Governance sets out clear roles and responsibilities and accountability

Quality Management
Comprises of **Quality Control** (our tools, processes and protocols that support what we do) and **Quality Assurance** (tracking our progress)



Quality Improvement is our systematic change method We use a consistent methodology to help us continually improve what we do

Quality improvement does not happen without good quality management. Quality Management comprises our quality controls (i.e. our tools, processes and protocols that support what we do) and quality assurance (i.e. the way we track or report on our progress to standards).

Quality assurance activities inform quality improvement. Quality improvement is our change methodology. We use a consistent methodology to continuously improve what we do (e.g. Plan Do Study Act or DMAIC).



Appendix 3: Accountability Framework

The purpose of the Accountability Framework is to outline our roles, responsibilities and delegated authorities to support best clinical outcomes, aspirations and experiences possible for all ACC customers.

Open the claim in EOS, salesforce and MFP

Start a **FILE SUMMARY** with the following information (obtained from the medical notes on file in EOS):

1) Claim Information

- Age and occupation of the client.
- Date and mechanism of injury, note the date of claim lodgement.
- Current cover under the claim, if any cover has been added to the claim after lodgement, and under what circumstances (was there CA/MA support for the additional cover. If not, we need to consider whether that cover is / was appropriate, and if it was not appropriate will need to consider revocation).
- Any previous Clinical Services advice on file, the questions addressed, clinical opinion, and the flow on effects of that advice / have the recommendations been actioned.

2) Weekly Compensation

- Whether the client is currently in receipt of weekly compensation. View corresponding medical certificates / ACC 18's.
- Whether they have received weekly compensation at all under that claim and if so, the relevant date range.
- When weekly compensation commenced in relation to the date of injury and if / when weekly compensation ceased and on what grounds.

3) Clinical History

- Time to presentation for treatment and who lodged the claim.
- The client's initial presentation and progression of symptoms as per the available notes on file. The client contacts / conversation transcripts can provide further information on this also.
- Any evident yellow flags.
- Any cultural considerations.
- Any relevant medical history and / or previous musculoskeletal history.
- If there is insufficient information on file to determine a clear picture of the client's initial presentation and progression of symptoms following the injury event, make a note to have the necessary information gathered by the case owner / recovery team member (as shown as available in MFP).
- Ensure reports for any specialist and radiology billed to the claim are on file (as per MFP).
- Make a note to request any medical information / radiology or specialist reports that are not on file.

4) Current Diagnosis

- Note the current diagnosis as suggested by the treating providers. All Medical certificates (ACC 18) need to be considered and screened for deemed cover.

5) Relevant previous claims

- If any of the treating providers reports / notes or radiology reports refer to any previous ACC covered injury as being relevant review these claims following the above processes.

If further information as noted above is required (from any identified relevant claim), request this from the referring recovery team member (RTM) and complete the guidance for now.

Once all the necessary information is available, start an ANALYSIS

This should include comment on:

- 1) The covered injury: Advice should include rationale regarding whether the covered injury has resolved, and if so, provide evidence to support this.
- 2) The current diagnosis, and evidence to support this: Make cover recommendations if cover requires updating. Including any cover revocation recommendations.
- 3) **Causation:** Provide detailed clinical rationale on whether (based on the information currently on file) the current diagnosis can be causally linked to the covered injury event, or any other ACC covered injury events. Where appropriate include reference to ACC consideration factors / relevant literature.
- 4) If there is no causal link can be between the identified relevant ACC covered injuries and the current diagnosis and the client is in receipt of weekly compensation, check the client's claim history (in EOS) to determine whether there are any other claims for the same body site.
 - As an initial check note previous claims in terms of the date of injury, mechanism of injury and treatment billed as per MFP or MFS records. (MFS is used for any billing prior to 2003/4).
 - Note reporting portal reports may be required to be run if the treating providers are referring to previous surgery prior to that visible in MFP and EOS (prior to 2003ish).
 - If following the above superficial check and any of the claims appear potentially relevant to the current diagnosis, then these claims will need to be considered in more detail in the 'FILE SUMMARY' as above.
- 5) **Rehabilitation:** If there is an ongoing causal link to symptoms / dysfunction and the covered injury, or there likely is one but further investigation is required, provide rehabilitation advice (e.g., pain physician assessment, pain management programme, vocational rehabilitation, commencement of the Vocational Independence process, etc). This can also include recommendations to move a claim from 'Assisted' to 'Supported' recovery if one on one case management is indicated and consideration of any cultural factors.
- 6) Whether further advice is required from a psychology advisor, medical advisor, or technical services.

Next Steps

- 1) State whether there is a causal link between the current diagnosis / symptoms / dysfunction / incapacity and the covered injury:

Option ONE

Causation is unclear - recommend what is required to clarify this:

- e.g., questions of the treating providers; onward specialist referral; internal advice from Medical Advisor, Psychology Advisor or Principal Clinical Advisor; ACC Technical Advisor input (e.g., whether an injury event occurred) etc.
- In the interim while awaiting answers to these questions also provide rehabilitation recommendations.

Option TWO

There is no causal link between the current diagnosis and any ACC claim AND the client IS in receipt of ACC weekly compensation. The advice will need to be referred to Technical Services for consideration of suspension of entitlements.

- Technical may make recommendations regarding further questioning of the treating providers, or that a Medical Case Review is required.

Option THREE

No causal link between the current diagnosis and any ACC claim AND the client IS NOT in receipt of ACC weekly compensation. Send comment and recommendations back to the RTM.

Option FOUR

Current diagnosis is attributable the covered injury. Send comment and recommendations back to the RTM.

2) Provide responses to the direct questions asked by the referring RTM.

- Address the questions asked. This is the final step in providing clinical advice. Comprehensive clinical advice cannot be provided without the above being considered first, irrelevant of what the question is.

3) Refer the claim for multi-disciplinary advice if indicated (MA, PA, TS).

Other things to consider

- 1) If you disagree with any of the previous clinical services advice on file, in the first instance discuss the claim with that advisor. Do not place advice on a claim that conflicts that of another clinical / medical advisor unless:
 - There is new information on file which would have altered that previous advice or
 - You can reference the conversation you had with the previous advisor and what agreement you came to in this conversation. It may also be that the specific advisor needs to make a comment on the file to document your discussion agreement.
- 2) If the client has been off work for more than a year, and there is no pending surgery or other barrier, consider recommending commencement of the Vocational Independence process (Initial Occupational Assessment / Initial Medical Assessment referrals).
- 3) Consider the need for multidisciplinary advisor input and if it is appropriate to contact a Medical Advisor, Psychology Advisor and / or Technical Services to discuss the claim before completion of your written guidance.
- 4) If any risk has been identified while viewing the claim, record it on the on the Clinical Risk Tool (e.g., provider behaviour, case management issues, etc).
- 5) Consider whether the claim has been appropriately case managed. If not, document in the clinical risk tool.
- 6) Consider whether there are any cultural barriers evident (e.g., language / cultural beliefs / access to appropriate services) that may need to be addressed by referral to a specific provider.

Clinical Guidance - Writing Style Guide

For ACC Internal Use

This Guide is a principles-based tool for documenting and communicating clinical guidance. Well communicated clinical guidance supports Recovery Team Member decision-making, resulting in positive client outcomes.

The mnemonic **ICARE, C**, helps us remember the 6 Guidelines.

Guideline	How to demonstrate the guideline
1. Identify yourself (Credentials) I	Include your name, role, qualification and guidance date.
2. Consider the Customer C	Use objective language understood by the Recovery Team Member and client. Consider any specific client context as relevant.
3. Identify the key Areas (Issues) A	Acknowledge issues identified by the Recovery Team Member. Identify other key issues relevant to the client's case/rehabilitation.
4. Provide a Rationale R	Review the client's individual information. Provide a clear analysis for your guidance, supported by the available evidence (with references if necessary).
5. Provide rEcommendations E	Provide actionable next steps which address the issues identified and move the claim forward. Consistently apply ACC legislation and policy. Proactively refer to other clinical advisors and Technical Specialists as needed.
6. Be Concise C	Use a brief writing style. Write the amount that is needed in the given context. (Short guidance for a simple case, and more in-depth analysis for high risk, high cost treatment requests, or where major client entitlements will be affected).

Scope

This Guide covers all clinical guidance delivered in ACC (initial, follow-up, single discipline, integrated and Hotline). Clinical guidance is an internal ACC clinical opinion that is recorded in the ACC Claims Management System (Eos).

The review process (see below) is not used for the assessment of individual performance, however it may be useful for coaching, self, or peer to peer review. The reviews do not assess clinical accuracy or correctness.

The Review Process

The Clinical Quality Leads group will:

- Complete regular reviews of clinical guidance in line with the Style Guide using the agreed [Marking Schedule](#).
- Provide regular feedback to clinical services teams about the findings of the reviews and work with teams to develop quality action plans.
- Review and make changes to the Style Guide to ensure it reflects current practice.
- Participate in regular moderation to improve inter-rater reliability and provide opportunities for continuous improvement.

How much detail is needed in my guidance?

Clinical Services Advisors provide clear, concise, timely, plain language clinical guidance that meets the needs of our internal customers. Clinical guidance supports a targeted approach to improving health outcomes, while helping more Māori, and helping people recover from injury faster. Brief clinical guidance (both hotline and written) is often all that is needed to meet recovery team member's needs, ACC's responsibilities, our clinical style writing guide, and professional body standards.

Medical and Clinical Records Requirements

When dealing with a client's medical or clinical records, always observe the requirements of the Privacy Act 2020 and the Health Information Privacy Code 2020. For more information, and the difference between personal and health information see ACC's privacy page [here](#).

Section 55 of the Act refers to the '*Responsibilities of the claimant to assist in establishment of cover and entitlements*' and generally extends to responsibilities at the request of the Corporation.

A client must supply ACC with the information needed to make a decision about a claim unless there is a reasonable reason not to. See the Accident Compensation (AC) Act 2001, Section 72.

When the client requests cover, additional diagnosis, support, or treatment from ACC, the onus/responsibility rests with the client and/or their provider to supply supporting clinical or medical information to help ACC to make the decision.

If the client and/ or their provider has not supplied the supporting information, ACC will, as part of its investigative role, request the relevant supporting information from the client, and their treating providers.

Relevant supporting information means the clinical or medical information that helps ACC to make a specific decision on the cover or entitlement request the client has made. This does not include 'nice to have' information that you would seek if you were directly providing patient treatment to help you solve the client's diagnosis or get to the bottom of the client's symptoms. For more information refer to [Conducting-medical-assessments-third-parties \(mcnz.org.nz\)](#). Once investigations are complete, a decision can be made by the decision maker on the claim.

If ACC is considering withdrawing support or treatment, revoking cover, or ceasing entitlements such as weekly compensation, then the onus/responsibility sits with ACC to request the supporting medical or clinical records. For more information please refer to the additional information consensus policy located in the Clinical hub [here](#)

Assessing impact of guidance

Use professional judgement to determine the time spent working up guidance. Whether more relevant supporting information is needed and the ultimate length of and detail in the guidance provided will depend on the individual claim. Guidance for Review or Court purposes, or guidance likely to be contested, may take more time. These instances are infrequent.

The role of the Clinical Advisor is to provide clinical expertise to help the decision maker establish ACC cover and entitlements. In distinct contrast to the treating practitioner role, the Clinical Advisor role does not extend to solving the client's diagnosis or getting to the bottom of the client's symptoms. If a claim appears straightforward, then brief guidance is recommended. If the claim later escalates, and further internal clinical guidance is needed, then the Review or Legal Specialist will request further comment from you that can be more comprehensive. When providing clinical guidance, demonstrate respect, empathy and understanding of the client's unique circumstances, including, where relevant, guidance that will prevent further injury. Please refer to the [Clinical](#)

In instances where the clinical evidence is in balance, focus on providing clear pragmatic guidance that helps internal customers support clients to get on with their recovery, and supports a targeted approach to improving health outcomes, while helping more Māori. Guidelines for using the CATHI-Q tool

Purpose

The CATHI-Q tool has been designed to enable meaningful appraisal of clinical comments provided for ACC by all clinical advisor groups. Ideally, use of the tool will facilitate continued improvement of the quality of clinical comments, and enable advisors to learn from their colleagues. The tool has not been designed to encourage 'pass or fail' judgements; where any gaps or potential areas for improvement are identified these should be taken as opportunities for discussion and learning.

Considering the individual circumstances of the client (e.g., cultural background)

The expectation is that you will consider the individual circumstances of all clients on whose claims you provide clinical guidance. Where factors such as the cultural background of the client are clearly relevant to their injury, treatment, or rehabilitation, these factors should be discussed and integrated into your guidance. For example, a claim for a client involving a work-related mental injury associated with a verbal altercation at work (which may not usually attract cover), may require Clinical Advisor Māori guidance if the event at work was perceived by the client to have involved a significant breach of cultural norms by a work colleague (e.g., mākutu). A specialist mental injury assessment by someone with particular cultural expertise may be necessary and appropriate in such circumstances.

Timeframes

Clinical Services has service level agreements in place with Client Services regarding the timeliness of clinical guidance, as below. Individual clinical advisors will not be able to independently influence achievement of the SLAs, but can support Clinical Services by taking tasks according to the due date prioritisation process, and by minimising the length of time tasks spend on their personal queue.

6. Be **Concise** **C**: Use a brief writing style. Write the amount that is needed in the given context. (Short guidance for a simple case, and more in-depth analysis for high-risk, high-cost treatment requests, or where major client entitlements will be affected).

EXAMPLE rationale for this question

Is the cover and/or diagnosis correct for this accident even?

- I have spoken with the provider and/or client who has advised they have a prolapsed disc not a lumbar sprain, or a rotator cuff tear not a shoulder sprain.
- I am unsure if the original diagnosis is still correct because the Expected Client Outcome indicates the client should have returned to work, or the client has advised they need surgery for a tear, but their covered injury is only a sprain.
- I have received medical/imaging reports e.g. x-ray/scan and I am unsure whether the diagnosis needs updating.
- I have received an ACC18 that indicates or has requested ACC update or add to the existing cover.
- A correct diagnosis is important for the Return to Work or Recovery Plan.
- Cover for a neck sprain and nose contusion has been approved, however Concussion Clinic report suggests concussion/mild TBI. I am unsure whether the diagnosis applied is correct for this accident event.
- I am unsure if the correct READ codes have been applied to this claim.

Is it appropriate to revoke and replace the cover diagnosis?

- Cover for lumbar disc prolapse with radiculopathy has been provided, however the MRI scan reports the cause of the compression to the L5 nerve root is critical spinal stenosis due to degenerative disc disease. There is no mention of a traumatic cause. I am unsure if it is appropriate to revoke and replace with lumbar sprain.
- Cover for pain in lumbar spine has been approved, however this is a symptom and not a diagnosis. I am unsure if it is appropriate to revoke cover and replace with lumbar sprain.
- Cover for an anterior cruciate ligament sprain has been awarded for the RIGHT knee, however the clinical notes indicate the LEFT knee was examined. I am unsure if it is appropriate to revoke cover and replace with anterior cruciate ligament sprain LEFT.
- Cover for a scaphoid fracture has been approved, however the X ray report mentions no fracture. I am unsure if it is appropriate to revoke the cover and replace with an alternative diagnosis.

Should the client have recovered from their covered injury/condition by now?

- The client's certification for their inability to work has deteriorated from Fit for Selected Work (FFSW) to Fully Unfit for Work (FUF). I am unsure if this is reasonable based on the injury and recovery progress.
- The Expected Client Outcome indicates the client is close to exceeding a duration band and I think the client should have recovered by now.
- The client is covered for a [xxx] injury, however indications are they are still not fit to return to work. I am unsure if ACC should continue with entitlement/s based on the covered [xxx].

Are the client's current or ongoing symptoms related to the covered injury?

- The client's recovery progress has deteriorated and appears to be off track because they are reporting persistent pain **and/or** new symptoms or because the treating provider has advised the injury is resolved **and/or** there are no further rehabilitation options. However, the client has reported they haven't fully recovered **and/or** have persistent symptoms/ pain and reports they are unable to return to pre-injury activities/ duties.

Is the requested support/treatment/rehab required to treat the covered injury?

- A treating provider has requested ACC to fund a service e.g. specialist appointment, investigation, pain service or social rehabilitation, however I am unsure if it is related to the covered [xxx] injury.
- I am unsure if the entitlement/treatment/rehab request is still required for the covered injury.

For the covered injury, when can I expect the client to return to work or independence?

- The ECO outcome indicates the client should have recovered by now. Can you confirm or advise how long it should take to recover given the injury, work type, age of client, co-morbidities and other factors. Based on this information I am unsure of the next steps.

Based on the findings in the report received, what ACC funded programmes would best support recovery?

- I have received [xxx] report, but I am unsure about the recommendations provided and what are injury versus non-injury related needs.
- I have received [xxx] report, but I am unsure if the recommendations are necessary and appropriate for the covered injury.

Is the requested period of inability to work related to the covered injury?

- I have received a request for back-dated Weekly Compensation, but I am unsure if the request period relates to the covered injury.

Are you able to provide questions to ask the treating provider?

- The client has a specialist appointment pending. Are there specific questions the client should ask the Specialist to help them, and ACC understand the current diagnosis?

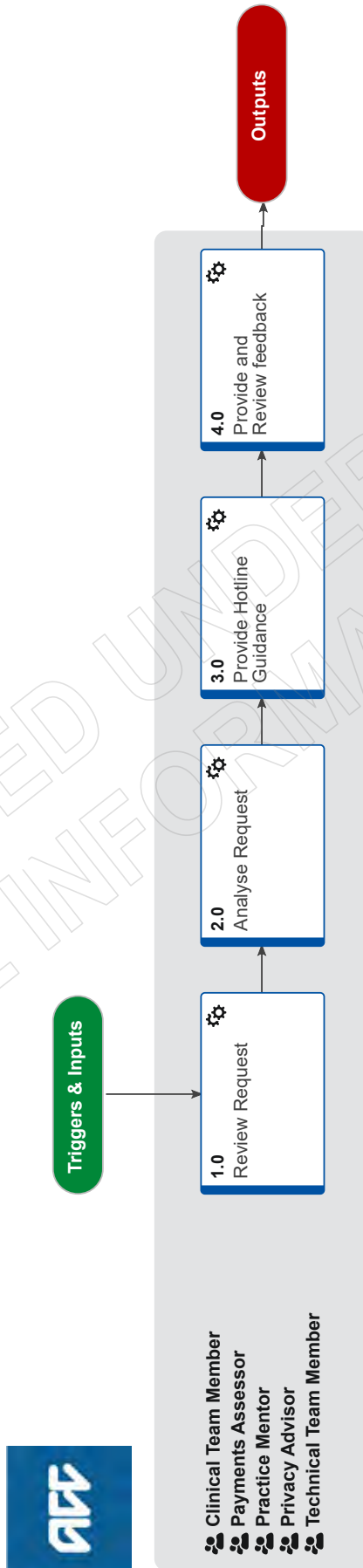

1.0 Review Request

Clinical Team Member, Payments Assessor, Practice Mentor, Privacy Advisor, Technical Team Member

- a** In Salesforce, open the claim using the claim number provided by the frontline staff member.

NOTE What if you are not a Salesforce user?

Open the claim in Eos using the claim number provided.

- b** Listen to the caller's question and confirm the steps that have been taken by the caller to resolve the issue.

NOTE What if you are aware of some self service content in Promapp, CHIPs, or within the decision tree tool?

Still provide your advice to the caller, but inform them that next time, they can refer to this specific process/piece of knowledge or tool to get the information they need.

NOTE What if you've been contacted directly, outside of the Hotline?

If the call is about clarifying advice you've already provided, this is appropriate.

If not, and this is the first time the staff member has done this, resolve their query and request that they use the Hotline next time. Advise that you won't be able to resolve their query next time if they call you directly.

If a staff member repeatedly calls the same advisor, redirect them to the Hotline and inform their Team Leader.

- c** Determine if you're the correct person to provide guidance.

NOTE What if you're not the correct person?

Decide who would be the correct person/advisor hotline and transfer the call. If you are unable to transfer the call to another person/advisor, suggest to the frontline staff member to call back later.

Refer to the guide below on how to transfer calls.

2.0 Analyse Request

Clinical Team Member, Payments Assessor, Practice Mentor, Privacy Advisor, Technical Team Member

- a** Assess whether the issue can be answered during the call (ie you can provide guidance within 15 minutes).

NOTE What if you're unable to provide guidance within 15 minutes?

If you're unable to provide guidance, recommend that the staff member requests Written Guidance

Ensure you document this in Salesforce by selecting "Create Guidance", "Hotline Guidance", and complete the mandatory fields.

For Payments, Privacy, and Technical Accounting services (TAS), if any guidance was provided, ensure you document this in Eos, in the "Add eForm" section of the Recovery Support subcase.

- b** Review the claim background information, including prior claims, if the frontline staff member has not already provided this.

NOTE What if you need more time to review information prior to providing guidance?

Inform the staff member that this will be the case, providing them with an idea of when they can expect you to get back to them, and how you will do this (Skype, Teams, Phone call etc).


3.0 Provide Hotline Guidance

Clinical Team Member, Payments Assessor, Practice Mentor, Privacy Advisor, Technical Team Member

- a** Provide guidance to the staff member

NOTE What if the issue needs additional guidance from a different Advisor, Specialist or Assessor?

Refer to the guide below for information on how to transfer calls to another Advisor, Specialist or Assessor or how to initiate a conference call with them.

 Skype Calling and Call Functionality

- b** Agree next steps with the staff member. Ensure there is an agreed understanding of the next steps before the call comes to an end.

NOTE What if you need more time to consider information and/or type up your guidance?

Set the expectation with the frontline staff member how long this will take, so they can prioritise other work whilst waiting for this guidance if needed. Give them the option of going on hold or ending the call and getting back to them once this guidance is completed, ensuring there is an agreed understanding of how you will do this.

- c** In Salesforce, record the guidance provided within the 'Recovery Support' tab, create the Hotline guidance form and fill in the fields.

NOTE What if you are a Clinical Advisor and you have received a request regarding Surgical guidance via the clinicaladvisorsurgery@acc.co.nz inbox?

These requests come via the Surgery and Additional Treatment team at ACC. Ensure you document this as a record of hotline guidance in salesforce. If you believe this query needs to be sent as a written guidance request inform the requestor and ask them to re-submit the request.

Advise the requestor to use the decision tree tool when trying to determine whether or not to send requests via the above email address vs the written guidance form in salesforce.

NOTE What if you are in Privacy, Payments, or TAS?

In Eos, record the guidance provided within the Recovery Support sub-case by selecting "add eForm" and completing the fields.

NOTE What if you need to edit or delete the Hotline Guidance you created?

In Salesforce open the hotline guidance:

- If you need to edit the hotline guidance to add/remove information, select 'Edit Hotline Guidance'
- If you need to remove hotline guidance entered on the wrong claim, select 'Delete'

If you are not a Salesforce user, you can edit your guidance in Eos via the Recovery Support sub-case for the above reasons.

NOTE What if there is no Recovery Support sub-case? (Privacy, Payments, TAS)

From the ACC45 claim select "Add Sub Case", then select Recovery Support.

4.0 Provide and Review feedback

- a** If applicable, provide feedback on the guidance request.

NOTE How do you provide feedback on the guidance request?

In Salesforce, navigate to the Recovery Support tab and select the 'Provide Feedback' option.

On the Provide Feedback form, complete the mandatory question and comments sections, and submit your feedback.

- b** If applicable, review feedback on the guidance provided.

NOTE What if you want to review some feedback you have received?

You will be notified you have received feedback by getting an alert notification from the "bell" icon in Salesforce. If you select this you will be able to review the feedback.

Alternatively, if you select the nine dots in the top left corner of the Salesforce window, and search for "Feedback", you can select this Feedback option.

From here you can select the drop down arrow to show different list views which display feedback from a range of dates.

NOTE What if you are a Team Leader and you want to subscribe to a feedback report?

Complete the steps below in Salesforce:

- Open the new report Folder "Feedback Reports"
- Open the new report " My Team's Feedback – Last 7 days"
- Click the down arrow at the top right of the report and select subscribe
- Schedule when you want the report subscription email e.g. 9am on a Monday every week.

Confirm recipient being added and run report as = "Me"

- Result will be an email to your inbox at that time/day, with a link to the report in Salesforce
- Last step will be to use the Team Leader filter, to narrow the results to your team members i.e. use the name your Salesforce user is set up with



Recovery Support to Determine Need for a Medical Case Review (MCR)

Objective

This document outlines the considerations and steps for Recovery Support to determine whether there is a need to refer for an MCR. It will assist in identifying the need at the right time or whether alternative steps could be taken to negate the need for one.

Background

An MCR can be used to obtain an opinion from a non-treating medical provider to clarify the current condition and/or determine the cause of a client's injury/condition or need for an entitlement. It is to be used where there is a clinical or medico-legal reason to obtain an independent expert opinion.

Key Principle – In most cases, clinical guidance should be able to be provided internally or addressed with the treating provider, without the need for independent expert opinion. Where an MCR is obtained, the accompanying opinion will carry significant weight.

Consideration Steps

The following steps are to be considered as part of the decision-making thought process leading to a recommendation to refer for an MCR. These steps are not rigid and do not replace good decision making given a specific scenario. They represent a guideline to assist the internal advisor to be consistent in when an MCR should be utilised.

- 1) Identify scenario and review clinical documents
- 2) Determine if need for MCR can be identified early
- 3) Determine need to write to treating provider
- 4) Consider whether additional internal opinion is appropriate
- 5) Consider whether need for MCR is based on clinical or medico-legal grounds

1) Identify scenario and review clinical documents *(Clinical Advisor, Medical Advisor)*

Confirm whether the task referral relates to a request for cover/entitlement (accept/decline decision) or to investigate the cause of need for an ongoing entitlement (suspension decision). This will identify where the burden of proof lies in reaching a decision (i.e. with the client for the former and ACC for the latter).

There are cases where both a cover and a suspension decision will need to be considered.

Briefly review the clinical records to familiarise yourself with the clinical aspects of the claim.

2) Determine if need for MCR can be identified early *(Clinical Advisor, Medical Advisor)*

The need for an MCR can be identified early in certain circumstances. This will result in avoiding unnecessary time being spent on providing a clinical opinion and/or delaying a referral.

Examples of appropriate circumstances where an MCR may well be required include -

- a) Requests or consideration for cover where specialist opinion is required, however, no treating specialist available. Cover request is for -
 - pain disorder
 - complex concussion / Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) / head injury
 - client's with relevant non-accident related co-morbidities
- b) Client is receiving an entitlement (e.g. weekly compensation) and the cause of ongoing symptoms or unfitness for work is unclear, or diagnosis is clinically complex. Client has no treating specialist.

- c) Client is receiving an entitlement (e.g. weekly compensation) and has ongoing unexplained symptoms beyond expected healing timeframes. Client does not have treating specialist with required expertise. Cover is accepted for –
- pain disorder
 - complex concussion / Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) / head injury
 - complex treatment injuries
- d) Client is receiving an entitlement (e.g. weekly compensation) and the treating specialist has expressed an opinion, with strong* supporting rationale, for an ongoing injury or accident related cause which you disagree with.

* beyond a non-plausible or temporal link only

Note – An MCR is not required when seeking an opinion or report on causation from a treating provider. Only where a non-treating provider opinion is required is an MCR used.

If the need for an MCR is not identified early, provide your clinical opinion and consider the next steps.

Key Principle – Identifying the need for an MCR early should negate the need for the Clinical or Medical Advisor to spend time completing an in-depth analysis of the clinical information and formulating their own opinion. Referring for MCR essentially outsources the clinical advice required.

3) Determine need to write to treating provider *(Clinical Advisor, Medical Advisor, Technical Specialist)*

In determining whether to write to the treating provider consider the following –

- a) The treating provider has provided a confusing opinion, contradictory information or has not indicated their opinion.
- Where the burden lies with ACC (i.e. for a suspension decision), it is likely necessary to seek further comment or opinion from the treating provider
- b) Does the treating provider have the relevant expertise? For example -
- Treating provider is the GP and specialist opinion is required
 - Treating specialist does not have the needed medical expertise given nature of issue
- c) If investigating a request for cover / entitlement, who has made the request (e.g. provider vs client/advocate)? For example –
- If the request is from a client/advocate and the issue can be addressed with internal clinical opinion, then writing to the treating provider may not be necessary.
- d) The complexity of the issue and/or injury history. For example -
- There is significant and relevant background documentation that requires review and consideration to inform an opinion. This might be beyond the availability of the treating provider.
- e) Is further comment or clarification from the treating provider likely to negate the need for an MCR?

If it is determined that it is necessary to write to the treating provider, decide if it is appropriate to either:

- a) Seek confirmation of your clinical opinion
- Refer to example template in appendix 1
- b) Provide questions only
- Refer to example template in appendix 2
 - Consider providing any background information that may be relevant and important to addressing the questions posed

- Consider if any background documentation is required to be provided with this request (e.g. a relevant historical report they may not have available to them)

When received, consider the response from the treating provider.

- If the response confirms or informs the clinical opinion, provide guidance and return the task to either the –
 - Recovery Team Member if the referral related primarily to a request for cover/entitlement (accept/decline decision) or non-weekly compensation suspension decision.
 - Technical Specialist if the referral related to investigating the cause of ongoing incapacity and ACC's ongoing WC entitlement provision (suspension decision)
- If the response is contrary to your opinion, or you disagree with the opinion provided, consider the level of evidence and robustness of the rationale provided -
 - If a temporal link, non-plausible rationale or no rationale has been provided, provide your opinion, confirm the guidance and return the task as in a) above.
 - If the evidence is perceived to be in balance (lay person or 50/50 test), continue to the next step. If you are unsure, consult with technical services.
- If the response raises new and relevant clinical or medical issues, and you consider these require additional or different internal clinical expertise, continue to the next step.

Key Principle – If a treating specialist provides an opinion and supports this with a plausible rationale, their opinion is likely to carry significant weight. Only in cases where a temporal link only, non-plausible or no rationale has been provided, would a well-reasoned internal clinical opinion likely carry more weight.

4) Consider whether additional internal opinion is appropriate

(Clinical Advisor, Medical Advisor, Technical Specialist)

In cases where the evidence is perceived to be in balance, or the clinical issue becomes complex, there are circumstances where seeking additional internal opinion might negate the need for an MCR.

This might include a Clinical or Medical Advisor seeking comment from a Principal Clinical Advisor with a relevant medical specialty.

Reasons for doing so may include –

- The issue falls outside the expertise of the Clinical or Medical Advisor
- For medico-legal reasons, the evidence does not allow for a robust decision (e.g. suspension decision). In this circumstance, consult with technical services on whether this action is likely to support a robust decision and negate the need for an MCR.

Factors to take into consideration may include –

- Whether there is a need for an in person or physical assessment. If so, this step is likely not appropriate.
- The size of the background documentation requiring review. If there is a large volume of documentation requiring review, utilising Principal Clinical Advisor resource may not be appropriate.
- Careful and discretionary use of the additional internal clinical resource

If obtaining additional internal opinion is considered appropriate, the rationale should be made clear and required expertise indicated (i.e. do not refer to a specific individual, rather identify the expertise required).

5) Consider whether need for MCR is based on clinical or medico-legal grounds

(Clinical Advisor, Medical Advisor, Technical Specialist)

Finally, if after having considered or having taken the above steps an MCR is still indicated, determine whether the need is based on clinical or medio-legal grounds.

a) Clinical grounds may include –

- Complicated diagnosis
- Diagnosis still unclear
- Issue outside expertise of internal capabilities

In these cases, the Clinical or Medical Advisor should progress to identifying the appropriate medical speciality required and providing appropriate questions before confirming and returning the guidance.

Please go to appendices 3 and 4 for further resources on provider and question selection.

b) Medico-legal grounds may include –

- Conflicting external opinions
- Conflicting internal verses external opinions

In these cases, seek guidance from Technical Services who will weigh the need for an MCR versus the risks and context of the claim/decision. As required, reach agreement on the need for an MCR, the appropriate medical speciality and questions required.

Please go to appendices 3 and 4 for further resources on provider and question selection.

Key Principle – Where an MCR is to be recommended for medico-legal reasons, technical services should be consulted as part of the decision-making process.

Appendix 1 – Example letter to treating provider

Dear Name of treating provider,

Thank you for providing ACC with the medical certificate / clinical information in relation to Client's name's recent injuries. A Clinical Advisor / Medical Advisor has reviewed the clinical evidence and advised:

1. Client's name's covered personal injuries of List of injuries are no longer a material cause of their presentation and incapacity for work as a Pre-injury role, and
2. Client's name's presentation and incapacity for work as a Pre-injury role is now more likely than not substantially due to Alternative condition, which was not caused by their accident of Date of injury for the following reasons Rationale.

Please let me know by return correspondence if our understanding of the clinical evidence and opinion is correct, and if not, please point ACC to the clinical evidence and provide your rationale for any alternative position to ACC's understanding above.

Thank you for your further time in responding to us.

Appendix 2 – Example letter to treating provider

Dear Name of treating provider,

Appendix 3 – Provider Selection

The required medical specialty of the MCR assessor should be clearly communicated in the written guidance.

In some cases, depending on the nature of the issue, there is more than one speciality that might be able to provide the assessment.

For example, confirming a diagnosis and opinion on the cause of a non-complex musculoskeletal issue might be adequately addressed by an orthopaedic specialist, sports physician or musculoskeletal physician.

In other cases, there might only be one medical speciality that can provide the required opinion. I.e. a neurologist for a complex neurological issue.







Consider the circumstances of the case and consider whether to –

- 1) Identify the preferred medical speciality and provide a list of suitable alternatives. Provide a comment noting that if the next available appointment with the preferred specialist type is not reasonably available (I.e. within 3 months) then the alternative options can be considered.
- 2) Provide the single medical speciality required in cases where only one is suitable.

Appendix 4 – Question Selection

The purposes for obtaining an MCR can be varied. Providing a background summary highlighting the need for the referral can often be valuable and important in ensuring the assessor understands the context in which their opinion is sought. It also provides an opportunity to highlight any important or relevant facts that are specific to the case.

In general, there are three circumstances from which we are seeking opinion –

		Diagnosis	Causation
1)	We need confirmation, or expert opinion, of the diagnosis and its cause.		
2)	The diagnosis is confirmed; however, we need expert opinion on its cause.		
3)	Both the diagnosis and its cause are confirmed; however, we need to distinguish between the relevant contribution of injury verses non-injury conditions.		

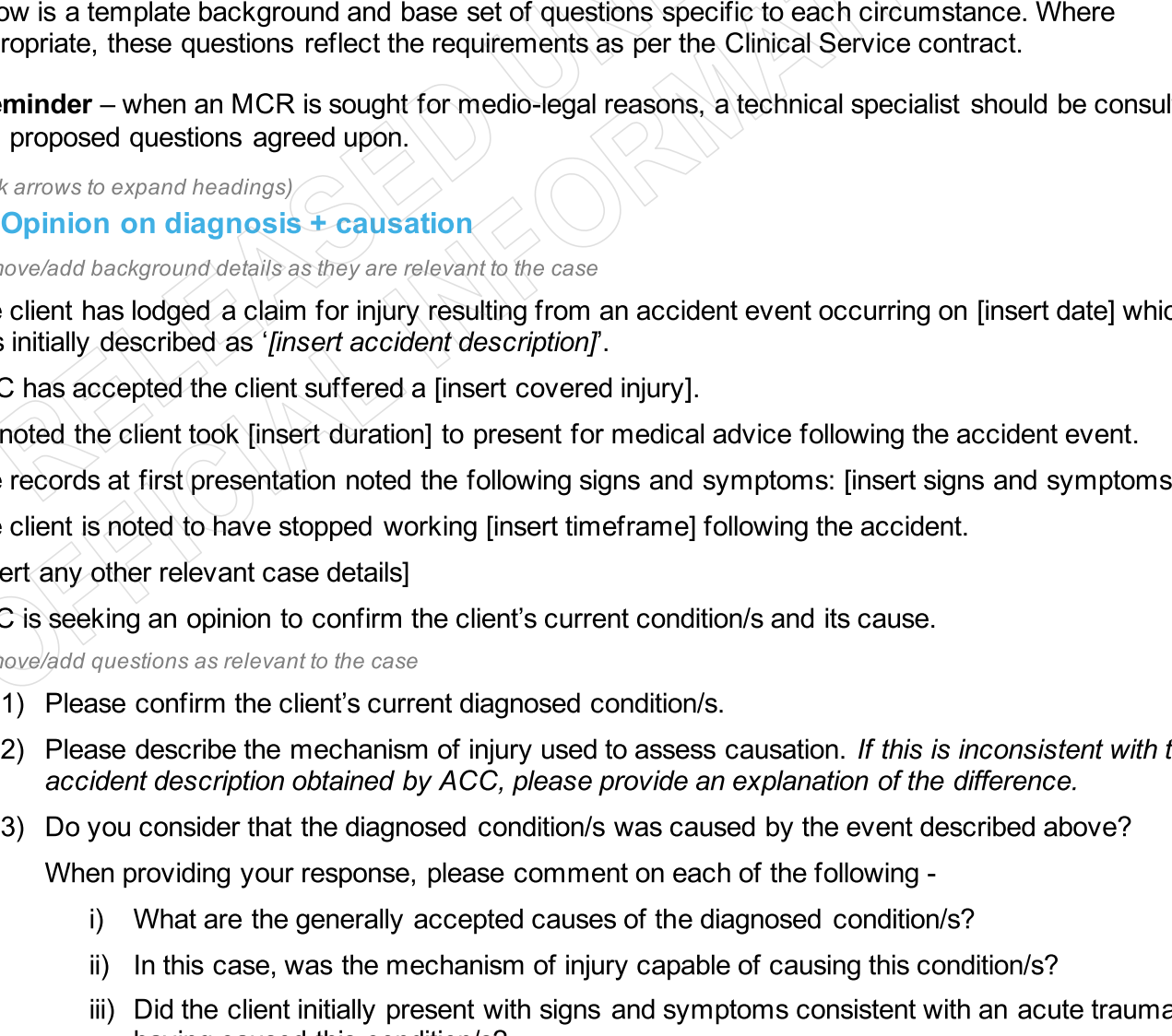
Below is a template background and base set of questions specific to each circumstance. Where appropriate, these questions reflect the requirements as per the Clinical Service contract.

***Reminder** – when an MCR is sought for medio-legal reasons, a technical specialist should be consulted and proposed questions agreed upon.

1) Opinion on diagnosis + causation

Remove/add background details as they are relevant to the case

- ii) In this case, was the mechanism of injury capable of causing this condition/s?
- iii) Did the client initially present with signs and symptoms consistent with an acute trauma as having caused this condition/s?
- iv) If applicable, please discuss why you ruled out other generally accepted causes.

- 4) Did the client suffer any other physical injuries as a result of the stated event? If so, do you consider these to have now resolved? *Please also comment on the status of any injuries ACC has accepted for cover.*
- 5) [Add any additional questions if required]
- 6) Do you have any comment on further clinical management (including investigation, treatment and/or rehabilitation) in this case?

2) Opinion on causation only

Remove/add background details as they are relevant to the case

The client has lodged a claim for injury resulting from an accident event occurring on [insert date] which was initially described as '[insert accident description]'.

- 3) Did the client suffer any other physical injuries as a result of the stated event? If so, do you consider these to have now resolved? *Please also comment on the status of any injuries ACC has accepted for cover.*
- 4) [Add any additional questions if required]
- 5) Do you have any comment on further clinical management (including investigation, treatment and/or rehabilitation) in this case?

3) Opinion on contribution of diagnoses to symptoms

Remove/add background details as they are relevant to the case

- 4) Does the covered condition/s otherwise medically restrict the client in any way? If so, please explain how.
- 5) [Add any additional questions if required]
- 6) Do you have any comment on further clinical management (including investigation, treatment and/or rehabilitation) in this case?

Common relevant additional questions

- **Recovery Timeframes:** What are the expected or typical recovery timeframes for [insert covered injury]?
- **Relationship to other claims (please note, it would be expected that there are contemporaneous medical records to accompany this question):** If the current condition/s was not caused by the stated event, is there any relationship to the following accidents or prior injuries?

Date of accident	Description of accident (if known)	Covered injury or diagnosis on ACC45

- **Consequential Injury:** If an accident event was not the cause, do you consider that the current condition/s are a direct consequence of a physical injury caused by the described accident event. If so, please explain why?
